While in St. Nicholas she was under the care of Mrs. Gilbert Gaudet, her sister, besides which there are left to mourn a father, three brothers Joseph in New York, Maxim in Chelsea, Isaac in Chelsea, Mrs. Marc Wilton, New Hampshire and Mrs. Leo Arsenault, Chelsea. During her last illness, which was meningitis of the brain she was visited by a great number of people and the large concourse at her burial was a silent testimony of the high esteem in which she was held. 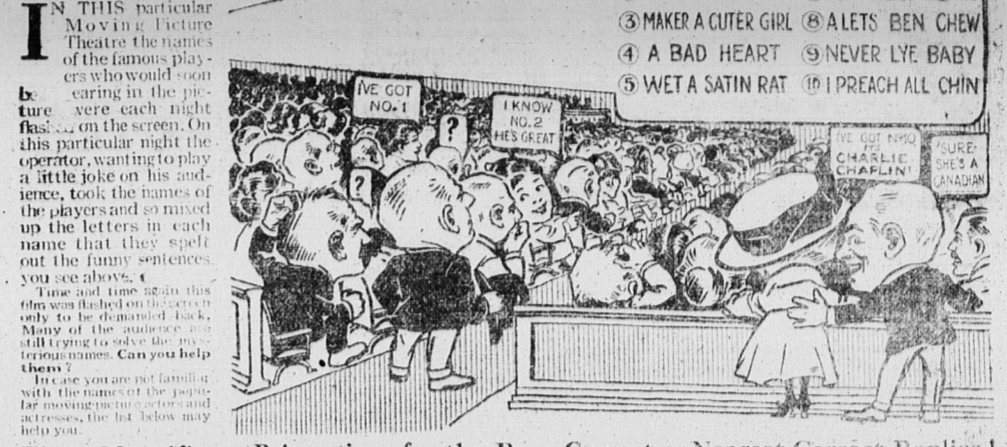

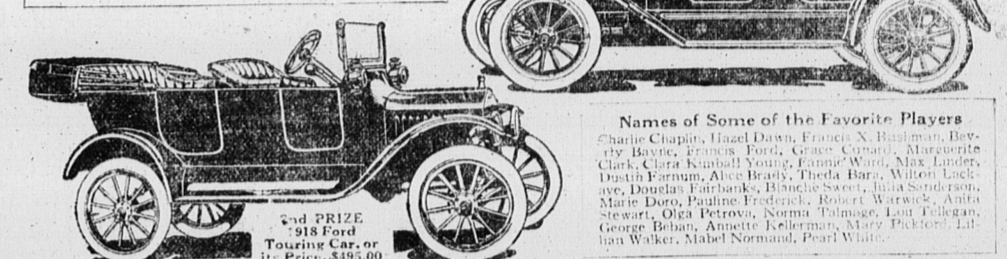
