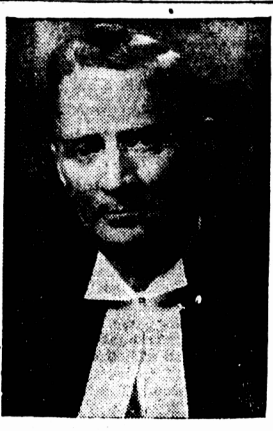

## All Hands Safe After 9 Hours In Boats

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—(AP)—Two United States ships which sped through gale-swept seas completed the rescue tonight of 46 men forced to abandon the U. S. Army's blazing "funeral ship," the Joseph V. Conolly, which still burned fiercely in the North Atlantic some 900 miles east of New York.

Officials stressed, however, that the offsets of 1942 refundable savings portion against tax indebtedness will "only occur in those cases where the tax debt has been established by the issuance of an official assessment notice by the department which has remained unpaid for more than one month."

It was brought out in a discussion, participated in by His Worship Mayor B. Earle MacDonald and City Councillors C.M. Cox and N.W. Democrats largely went along with the President, calling the estimate reasonable at a time when, as Senator Tom Connally (Dem., Tex.) put it, "the world is in a state of chaos."

## \$40,000 Fire At Sydney Today

SYDNEY, N. S., Jan. 12.—(Tuesday)—A fire of unknown origin which smoked for more than an hour before flames appeared early today gutted the Dome Grill on Charlotte Street here and adjacent houses in a nearby hotel and a bank were forced to evacuate.

## Land Speeds Up To 1,019 Miles Reported

MUROO AIR BASE, Calif., Jan. 12.—(AP)—Northrop Aircraft Company's probing conditions on "the other side" of the sonic barrier, has sent land vehicles hurtling over tracks at a speed of 1,019 miles and hour, the company announced today.

## General Election In Eire On Feb. 4

DUBLIN, Jan. 12.—(AP)—President Sean P. O'Kelly dissolved Eire's Dail today and set Feb. 4 as the date for a general election. Balloting promises to be the most keenly contested of any Eire election since Prime Minister Eamon de Valera won power 15 years ago.
