Sea Bed Surveyed By Echo Device

A complete graph, showing the contours and depths of the sea bed of Bass Strait, Australia, which has been recorded on the echosounding device of the Bass Strait passenger liner Tararua, will be of great value in the laying of the submarine telephone cable across the strait. On a voyage from Tasmania the Tararua's course was diverted, and she steamed over the exact route the cable will follow.

Throughout the voyage the electrically operated echo depth recorder was continuously reproducing the levels of the sea bed on chemically prepared graph paper. The cable ship Faraday, owned by Siemens Brothers and Co. Ltd., London, the successful tenderers for the work, will begin work on the cable this month. —Australian Press Bureau.

Salt, pepper, and sage or all-spice are used for preserving and flavouring sausages made on the farm. Thirty pounds of sausage meat will require 1-2 lb. of table salt, 2 oz. pepper, and 1 to 2 oz. of sage if the sausage is for immediate use, or 1-2 to 2 oz. of all-spice, instead of sage, for long keeping. These ingredients should be mixed dry and thoroughly incorporated with the sausage meat.

Brisk Christmas Business Boom

SOUTH PARIS, Me., Dec. 12—Christmas business in this wood products manufacturing town was in the boom stage today, far surpassing, manufacturers said, anything in years past.

Looking Forward To U.S. Election

(This is the final article of a series reviewing potential Republican presidential nominees for the 1936 United States election.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 15—When Arthur Hendrick Vandenberg was nine years old he sold newspapers. Today, at 51, he is Senator for his native Michigan and carrying the Horatio Alger tradition another step—is a prominent possibility to lead the Republican party into next November's United States elections.

The depression of 1893 sent him out to earn his keep as a kneepanted boy. It caused the collapse of his father's harness store in Grand Rapids. The elder Vandenberg blamed the Democrats for the depression and, so the story goes, on his deathbed adjured little Arthur to be a Republican.

The Senator's career, showing how well he kept his father's trust, reads like fiction.

But fiction will be dwarfed by the next chapter. If the presidential nomination falls to him and the voters choose to elevate him to the "Great White Throne" at Washington.

Vandenberg is confident the present incumbent of the "throne," President Franklin Roosevelt, and his Democratic New Dealers, are destined to be turned out. He foresees the election would save the American system from disintegration, and who prefer the substance of recovery to its shadow.

The Michigan Senator is not wholly against the New Deal and distinctly not wholly for the old deal. He is a liberal of moderate stripe—something in his favor the present indications, that the G. O. P. platform is scheduled for liberalizing, are borne out at the party's national convention in June.

Among New Deal measures which drew his support were the Social Security Act, aid for distressed farm and urban home-owners, the bank deposit guarantee and neutrality legislation. With Senator Nye of North Dakota, he sponsored the Senate munitions inquiry and received the editorial plaudits of many newspapers.

While he is a stand-patter in some things, as evidenced by his entire journalistic career having been spent on the Grand Rapids Herald with which he rose from office-boy to president, and the fact he still lives a stone-throw from the home where he was born, he is no stand-patter politically. Recently he gave Republicans this advice:

"The voters cannot be won by a standpat program. It cannot be done by static viewpoints or by stolid entrenchment against reasonable evolution toward a larger and more effective social responsibility on the part of government."

Vandenberg has dabbled in politics almost from the day he left the University of Michigan. He was a county Republican secretary in his early 20's. He did not run for office, however, until 1926 when his home state promptly sent him to the Senate. The nimble brain that functions beneath his grey locks quickly made him a national figure.

The Senator retains the bustling aptitude for work which marked his meteoric rise in the newspaper field. To vice-president John Nance Garner he is "Dynamite" Vandenberg.

Axmen Busy Cutting Christmas Trees

All through Canada axmen have been busy helping Santa Claus prepare for Christmas and this year he expects to do a rushing business, according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Some 4,000,000 Christmas trees will be cut in Canada for the United States market alone to delight the hearts of kiddies in Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Illinois, Missouri and other states in the Union on Christmas morning. The bulk of the cut from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick goes to cities in the Eastern States, New York alone ordering about 50,000 trees from Canada every December. From early reports of shipments from Ontario, Quebec and the Maritimes, the supply of the Canadian Christmas trees available to the American public will be considerably larger this year than ever before.

In addition to this large cut for the American market, anywhere from 500,000 to 1,000,000 Canadian trees are adorned during the Yuletide season with the favorite tree of St. Nicholas, the patron saint of this celebration. Piles of Christmas trees are now coming into evidence about country stations of the Canadian National Railways in the Maritimes, Quebec, and Ontario, these trees later being the centre of Christmas celebrations in homes across the continent, which they will soon adorn.

The origin of the use of trees for decorative purposes at Christmas time is lost in antiquity but it is believed that the custom has been adopted from pagan ceremonies, though it is only in comparatively recent years that the Christmas tree has become thoroughly popular in North America and the British Isles.

Conservationists are agreed that the cutting of Christmas trees is not wasteful as the majority of these trees would have small chance of reaching marketable size as timber. The cutting of such trees also assists the larger trees in attaining bigger growth since most of the trees for decorative purposes may be described as undergrowth which sap a lot of strength from the ground and hinder the growth of more sturdy trees.

RAIL EMPIRE BUILDER PASSES

Mantis James Van Sweringen Who Rose To Railway Fame With His Brother Oris, Succumbs.

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) CLEVELAND, Dec. 12—Death dissolved a partnership today, which carried the brothers Van Sweringen from the obscurity of rural Ohio to the top of the railroad world.

Mantis James Van Sweringen, 54, the younger, succumbed to influenza and hyperensive myocarditis, an inflammation of the muscular portion of the heart wall. His physicians announced influenza was a contributing factor, induced by "general exhaustion and mental and emotional strain," traceable to the tumultuous financial affairs of Van Sweringen interests subsequent to the 1929 market collapse.

Oris Paxton Van Sweringen kept vigil in the lonely hours before dawn beside his brother's deathbed in Lakeside Hospital before his death at 7:15 a. m.

As they faced the world and won recognition, the brothers averted the specter of death-together.

Van Sweringen was born July 8, 1881, at Wooster, O. Oris was then two years old.

The inseparable brothers developed exclusive suburban Shaker Heights, the scene of their boyhood, after having failed in a previous venture.

Their first venture into transportation was the purchase of a rapid transit line to serve Shaker Heights residents. In quick succession, they acquired the New York, Chicago and St. Louis Railroad, the Toledo and Western, the Lake Erie & Western, the Detroit-Toledo Shore line, the Chesapeake & Ohio, the Pere Marquette, the Hocking Valley, the Wheeling & Lake Erie and, finally, the Missouri Pacific and its subsidiaries.

Throughout their unprecedented expansion Mantis was the visionary, Oris the executor—yet associates assert they ranked equally in business acumen.

Neither married. They shared a town house and a country home with their sisters, Edith and Carrie. Acquaintances assert it was traditional that all business matters, however trivial were settled by conferences between them.

Promotion Comes To Capt. W.B. Armit

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 15—The appointment of Captain W. B. Armit, R.D., R.N.R., recently master of the R. M. S. Lady Rodney in service between Canada and Bermuda, the Bahama Islands and Jamaica, to the position of assistant marine superintendent for the Canadian National Steamships, with office at Halifax during the winter, was announced today by Captain E. E. Tedford, acting general manager of the company. Born at St. Andrews, Scotland, July 25, 1885, the lad who is now Captain Armit, his native Scotland to answer the sea, was which came from reading Robinson Crusoe, and similar yarns. The blue eyed, tenaged youth joined the barque "Invincible" as a sea cadet, and thus saw San Francisco and voyaged round the Horn, 152 days of experience which he dismisses now as "the usual beginners voyage." He passed for master at Greenwich in 1911, during which year he was relieving officer aboard the famous "Lusitania" and also with the "Carpathia," "Carmania," the old "Albatross" and the "Pannonia." In 1911 he joined the Royal Naval Reserve earning his present suffix, R.D., R.N.R., Captain Armit took part in the great naval review of 1915 at Spit Head and was commander of H. M. S. "Reindeer" through stirring world war adventures around the Dardanelles. He later captained a dozen Canadian National liners, including the S. S. "Prince Robert" on her good will and trade mission

Will Be Mild Winter Says Indian Chief

It's going to be a mild winter and there won't be much need for overcoats. Rubbers may come in handy but mufflers will be out. This is the prophecy of Chief Sam Snake, of the Ojibway Indians, on the Rama Reserve, and his words are concurred in by Black Hawk, the tribal prophet, who himself has seen 72 winters and has been busy forecasting them for at least 50. Chief Sam Snake bases his weather prophecy upon nature's natural barometer, the fur-bearing animals and birds, a number of nature's signs. In a telegram received by the Toronto Passenger Department, Canadian National Railways, the Chief stated that the geese on their southward journey flew higher than they have for years, a sure sign of an open winter. The foxes and other fur-bearing animals have not donned a heavy coat this fall and the heavy but mufflers do not think that a winter home will be a necessity. Even the fish have not taken to deep water, as they would ordinarily do, if heavy frosts were promised.

Prophet Black Hawk goes even further than Chief Sam Snake. He predicts that in the north snow will not fall more than a foot in depth. This fact is indicated by the deer, which are scratching their hooves on trees and bushes just 12 inches above the ground. Through some strange intuition, Prophet Black Hawk finds that deer invariably select as their scratching mark the depth that subsequent snow will fall. And to clinch his statements, the prophet claims that there will be practically no snow fall along the shores of Lake Ontario.
