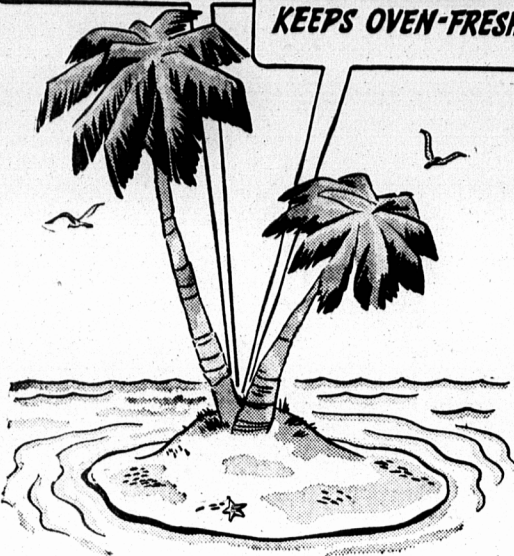

The Duchess of Kent believes in the educational value of nursery rhymes and fables. She has had these woven into two nursery rugs for her children. Prince Edward's rug depicts in gaily colored Scottish wools seven favorite English rhymes. Prince Alexander's rug is inscribed in her mother's childhood tongue—French—and illustrates 34 of Lafontaine's fables. One day these hand-made rugs, each 7ft. 6 in. by 4 ft. 6 in., will become heirlooms in the Royal family. Experts believe that they are capable of three centuries of hard wear. The Scottish wool is woven on a twisted Scottish linen basis of greater strength than that employed in many old English carpets still in use. The animals on the rugs have provided the Royal babies with their first adventure in the world of imagination. Nurse Smith is called on to relate how the cow jumped over the moon; this makes the centre panel in Prince Edward's rug. We are told that the little Prince is to leave to court from his rug; the figures are printed down left side, and he will say the alphabet from the letters printed across the top and bottom. All her five names, Alexandra Helen Elizabeth Olga Christabel, and the date of her birth in French are woven into Princess Alexandra's rug. From which she will make acquaintance with Lafontaine's animal characters, among them the crow with the cheese and the grasshopper and the ant, the deer who saw his reflection, the hare and the tortoise.
