THE MOROCCAN CONFERENCE.

Nominally the conference now sitting at Algiers was called by the Sultan of Morocco. Really it was called at the instance of Germany. Morocco is not a member of the European family of nations, and is too insignificant and obscure to call the great powers together of its own initiative. But with Germany behind the Sultan and because the peace of Europe might be involved the call for a conference became effective.

The sticking point in the Conference, and which may cause its break-up appears to be the claim of France to police Morocco. France holds that her interest in Morocco being much greater than any other power, she will be responsible for the maintenance of order in that state. Germany contends that the maintenance of order there is a matter of international concern, and that no one power should be given an inside and controlling position in Morocco.

Now this point of difference is of a nature recognised on both sides as vital, and is one in regard to which all the powers represented in the Conference must come to an agreement, or nothing can be effected. Thus any one nation holds a practical veto power, but Germany is in the worst position of any power to exercise this veto. For Germany, having practically called the Conference together, is more than any other responsible for its success, and could not afford to break it up by holding out against what all the other powers might agree to. That would be virtual defeat.

So far as is known, Britain firmly supports the contention of France, and Russia stands on the same side but less firmly. Spain and Italy also favor the French view. The position of Austria-Hungary is not clearly defined, but otherwise Germany stands alone and there is no possibility of any unanimity of the Conference being secured for the German

contention. France cannot be expected to yield while, as appears to be the case at present, she has the majority in her favor. The position of Germany is therefore an awkward and most undesirable one. The Kaiser's meddling brought about the Moroccan trouble and the Conference, and the majority of the Conference is against him. Unless the Kaiser wants an excuse for war, which is improbable, he will not want the Conference to fail of effecting a settlement, nor can he very well accept a settlement which would be against the German contention and in favor of France.

Every effort has been made to come to terms by compromise. The policing of Morocco cannot be avoided, and is admitted by all to be necessary. The subject cannot be withdrawn from the Conference, and that body must either pronounce upon it or break up without effecting anything. It may be that Germany is seeking a pretext for war, but if such is not the case the breaking up of the Conference would still seriously menace the peace of Europe.

Premier Tweedie of New Brunswick in his budget speech announced the forestry policy of his Government. It includes a thorough survey of all the crown lands, forest reserves at the head of streams to conserve the water supply, and regulations to prevent the tops and branches of cut trees being left in the forest. The object of the latter regulation is greater security against forest fires, but it will be very difficult to carry out. In the case of hemlock trees cut down for removal of the bark, it will be required that the trunk and limbs shall also be removed.

Attorney General Pugsley has introduced in the New Brunswick Legislature a new Judicature Act. It will abolish the Supreme Court and the Supreme Court in Equity and will establish a Supreme Court of Judicature with appeal and trial divisions, three judges in each. The appeal Judges will hear all appeals from other courts, and other applications now heard by the full court. The trial Judges will hold circuits and will not sit in appeal except in rare cases. If the bill becomes law it will necessitate the reappointment of all the Judges now belonging to the Supreme Court.

The New York Times takes note of the fact that the holidays in honor of Washington and Lincoln are from year to year less heartily observed. The Times argues that the national reverence for these great names is increasing and that the national estimate of the greatness, wisdom and nobility of these men was never before so high. It finds the trouble to be that the nation does not care for holidays, and apart from the Fourth of July, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas there is a disposition to pass them over lightly, or devote the days to business or sport. But any proposal to formally abandon the days set apart to the memory of Washington and Lincoln would be resented.

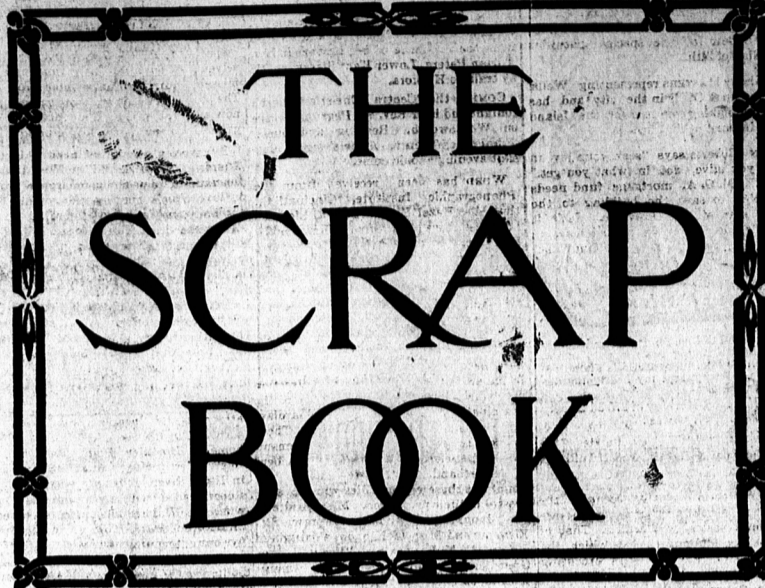
