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Opening Of Fox Pelt Show Is Delayed

Entries for the annual pelt show of the Prince Edward Island Fox Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association will close on January 15th according to information received over the week-end. After all entries are in the long and arduous task of classifying the large number of pelts takes place beginning January 17th a task which is growing heavier each year due to the increased number of pelts and a larger number of exhibitors who are entering.

The annual show has for several years been held in the Summerside High School auditorium and will in all probability be held there again this season, although this has not yet been definitely decided upon. The huge auditorium has many advantages for this display. However many exhibitors feel that this annual pelt show would draw a very much larger attendance each year if the pelts were on display and judged nearer the business district.

Mr. Douglas Bell of Carleton, who has for the past several years judged the show to the entire satisfaction of the ranchers, has again consented to act in that capacity.

Judging will begin on the morning of January 19th. From present indications a larger number of pelts will go before the judge than last year and it was mainly due to the large number being received that the dates of the show were changed from January 5-7th to 19-21st. At the conclusion of the judging the annual banquet will be held at Leo Coyle's Restaurant.
