A. F. Webster has lately added to the equipment of the Star Steam Laundry a large Troy Duplex mangle, the necessity for which has been made very apparent, lately because of increasing business. It has a central steel cylinder 24 inches in diameter and another 8 inches in diameter and both 100 inches in length. Both these are heated by steam. There are five padded rolls engaging the heated cylinders, and thus large pieces such as sheets can be put through without folding and thoroughly ironed and dried. Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.
 ANY even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 21, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section acres, more or less.
 Entry must be made, personally at the local and office for the district in which the land is situated.
 The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith upon one of the following plans:
 (1) At least six months residence upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
 (2) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.
 (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
 Six months' notice in writing should be given the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
