CZAR A PRISONER IN HIS PALACE

While His Not Very Loyal Subjects are Chopping Off Their Fingers to Render Them Ineligible for Service in the Army

LONDON, March 22.—All the St. Petersburg correspondents of London newspapers are most pessimistic. The Daily Mail's correspondent thinks the central fact of the situation is that since the blessing of the Neva (Jan 19), the emperor has been a prisoner at Tsarskoe Selo, and never once has ventured to the capital. He says: "In the moment of the greatest national emergency, needing the greatest sympathy between the government and the people, the ruler remains secluded behind triple bars and bayonets, as remote and absolutely aloof from the people as if he were in another planet."

The Daily Telegraph's correspondent says: "If the command to mobilize is obeyed, the war will be prosecuted indefinitely, despite the failure to float foreign loans, but all symptoms point unmistakably to the spirit of resistance growing among the people. Men are unwilling themselves for military service by chopping off their fingers in such wholesale manner that Grand Duke Vladimir has turned his attention to the matter. In a word, I am personally convinced that an insurmountable obstacle to the continuation of the war will be found in the dogged determination of the Russian people to prefer the risks of open disobedience at home to certain death in Manchuria or Siberia. This consummation will mark the simultaneous victory of the Japanese abroad and liberalism in Russia."

INCREASED EXPENDITURE FOR NAVY JUSTIFIED

The Whole Naval Aspect of the World Has Changed and It Is Up to Great Britain to Take Into Account What Other Nations Are Doing.

LONDON, March 22.—In the House of Lords last evening the naval expenditure was discussed on the call of the Liberal leader, Earl Spencer, for papers regarding the naval programme. He said he did not desire to condemn the Government but he wanted an explanation of the plans involving the withdrawal of such a large number of vessels from the list of vessels which could be commissioned for active service, and the reasons for the increased expenditures since 1894 and 1895.

Viscount Goschen justified the vast increase in the last fifteen years. He said the two power standard was no longer applicable. One thing had been strongly brought out by the Russo-Japanese war, namely, difficulties which might arise with neutrals and the necessity of maintaining an attitude of dignity and power thereto. Viscount Goschen said he did not think there was any harm in discussing these questions. Chancellor Von Buelow was very candid in his remarks with regard to European policies. Continuing, Viscount Goschen said when any power with twelve battleships was ready within one hundred miles of English coast, that was the power which must be considered side by side with preparations to meet any two powers with whom Great Britain might have to deal.

A RICH FIND.

AKRON O., March 21.—While walking along the south shore of Silver Lake today, George Lodge stumbled upon a huge billet of metal which was found to be silver. Making further investigation he and his brother dug out twenty six large billets of an average weight of 100 pounds, making over a ton in all. It is thought to be Indian treasure left there more than 100 years ago.

WEDDING CELEBRATION ENDED IN A FATALITY

Chicago Policeman who Tried to Break up Italian Merry-Makers, was Attacked and Shot One of the Part.

CHICAGO, March 22.—A wedding celebration at Clarke's, Polk Street, was terminated suddenly by policeman Henry Dicker, who shot one of the merry-makers, Vito Malpedo, inflicting a fatal wound. Half a dozen Italians, one of whom was Malpedo attacked the policeman because he had ordered them to disperse. Malpedo ran into a saloon, snatched a club from behind the bar, and felled the officer. Dicker regained his feet and used his own baton on the Italians. Malpedo rushed on him again from behind and dealt a terrible blow that sent the policeman to his knees. Two men seized his club and Dicker drew his revolver as Malpedo came toward him again with the club uplifted. At the first shot the Italian fell. Hundreds of dwellers in "Little Italy" ran from the tenements. Women threw themselves upon the man who lay wounded in the street. The police were notified, and when a wagon load of reserves arrived, more than 1,000 men, women and children were struggling in the street. Officer Dicker, covered with blood, stood at the side of the man he had shot, and held another of his assailants under arrest. After his injuries were dressed he returned to his post.
