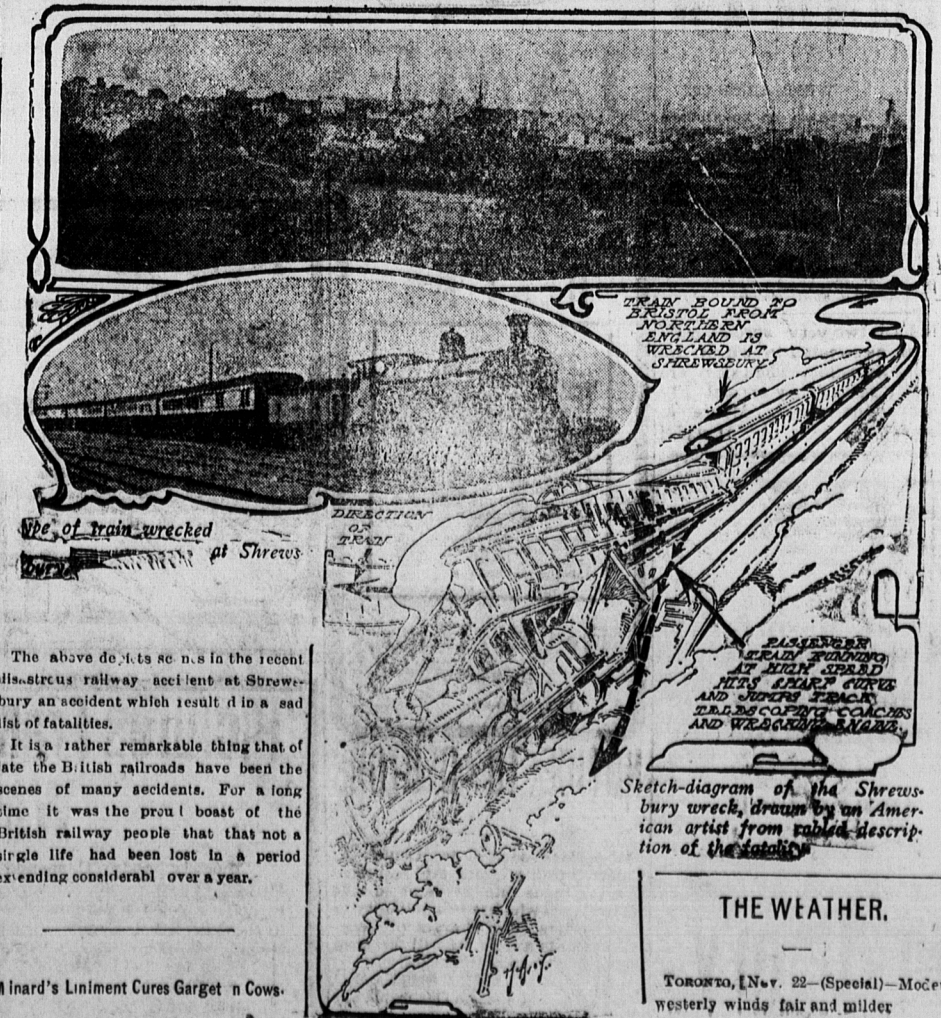
# PLAYED THE PIPES AND IT WAS 23 FOR THE WOLVES
