From the Trenches

The enclosed letter has been received by Mrs. J. Kane, McNeil, from her son Justin:—

Feb. 21st, 1917.
"Somewhere in France"

My Dear Mother:—Received your letter some time ago, and of course I was glad to hear that you were all well. Well mother, your letter was written Xmas Day. I spent a better Xmas this year than last year, for on Xmas Day I left the trenches to go on a few days leave to England. You can imagine how glad I was to get a well earned rest. However, I went to England and spent New Years there, and although I had no friends to go to, I still had a nice time, for one can make friends wherever you go. I intended to take a trip to Ireland but the time being so short or at least it seemed short, I did not go. Of course I was in Ireland before we came over here to France. I tell you mother, it was nice to get away, where you could not hear the "rattle of the guns, or the bullets whizzing over your head. I suppose it will soon be getting spring here over there now. We have had some very cold weather here, but it is getting mild again. Yes, spring will soon be here, and this war still going strong. I expect you are all getting tired of it. Well to tell you the truth I wish it would soon come to an end, for I have been here now sixteen months, and have seen quite a lot of war. I consider myself pretty lucky so far, for I have been in some pretty warm corners, but the Hun hasn't scratched me yet.

Well mother, do not worry over me. Life is too short to worry. You always want to look at the bright side of things. This is the kind of a life that makes a fellow think of home and mother.

I certainly could tell you some long stories, if I was sitting by the fireside with you once more.

Now, I guess I have written enough for this time. Don't forget to write soon. With love to all.

Beagan for the very efficient manner in which he managed the local circle for 1915. Special mention might be made of Mr. Martin Power, who in his usual excellent style sang a number of comic songs, Messrs Chas. Walker and John Gauthier who contributed a very pleasing duet, and Messrs. W. MacDonald and

E. Brazel who delighted the audience by giving some very graceful step dancing. The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.
