Mr. Ray Mutch, Earnsccliffe, who was seriously ill with pneumonia is fast on the road to recovery.

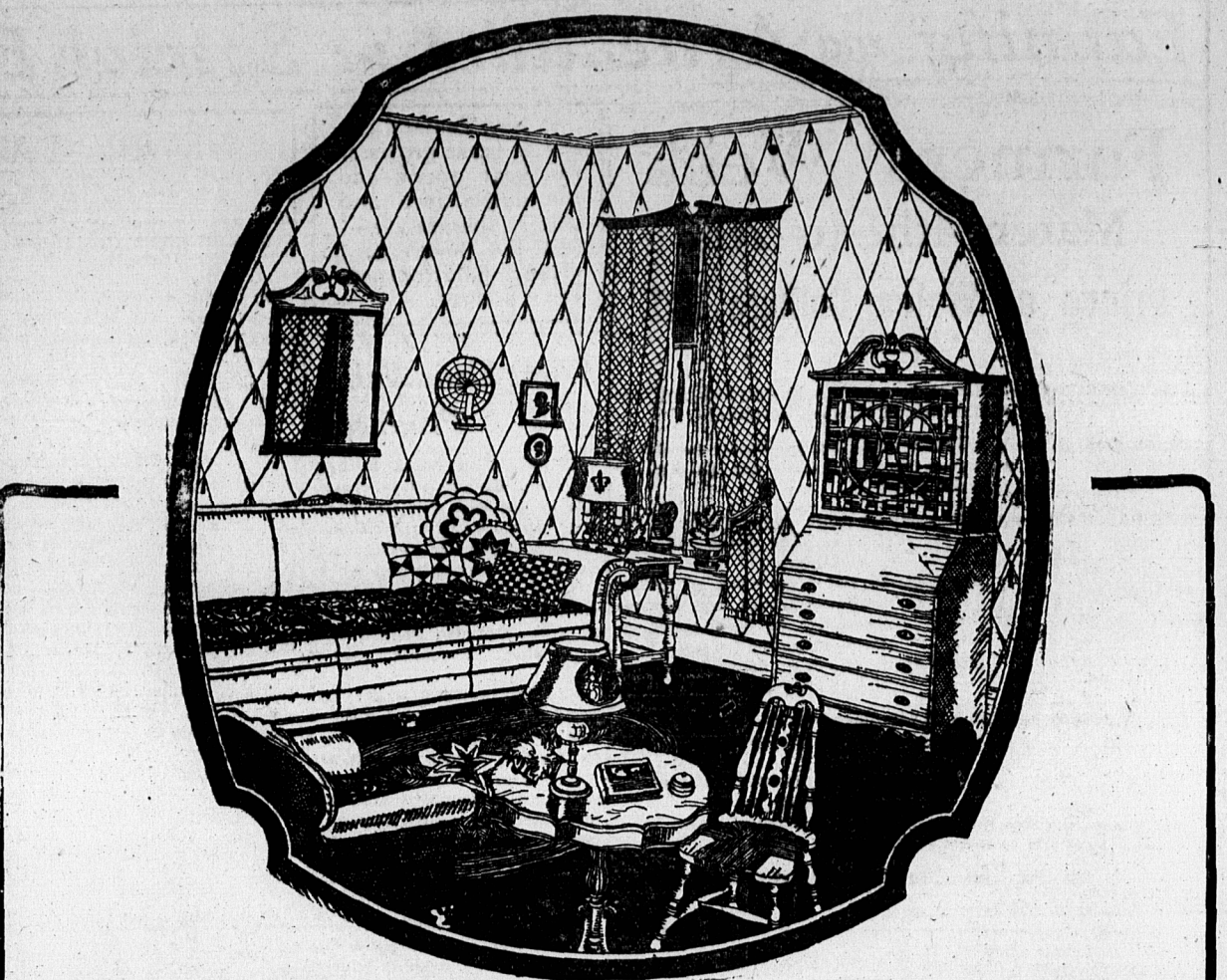
Mr. Edward Curron, Avondale was a recent visitor to Vernon.

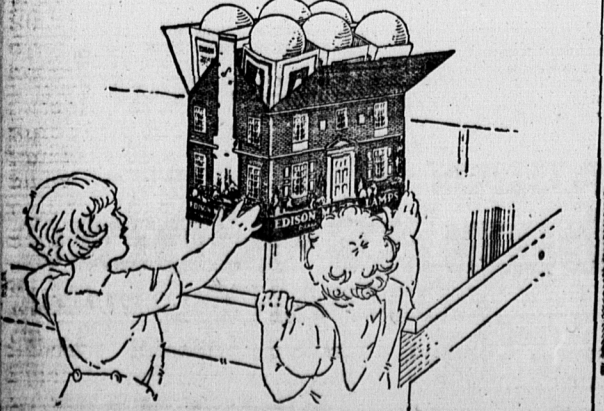
