"NO REFERENCE TO MERITS OF PROPOSAL"

Premier King Interviewed Re Repudiation Of Riddell Motion At Geneva.

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—The Dominion government's statement of last Sunday, denying responsibility for Dr. Walter A. Riddell's oil sanction proposal at Geneva, had reference only to the origin of the suggestion, Premier Mackenzie King declared tonight.

"I had no reference to the merits of the proposal which will be considered when the proper time arrives," the Prime Minister said.

Mr. Mackenzie King was interviewed tonight at the close of the first cabinet council he has held since his return from an absence of three weeks, most of which was spent at a holiday resort in Georgia.

An impression had gone abroad that the Canadian government had taken the initiative in advocating an extension of the sanctions against Italy to include oil, coal and iron. That impression was, erroneous, the Prime Minister said, and the government had thought it advisable to correct it.

Dr. Walter A. Riddell, Canadian permanent adviser at the League of Nations in Geneva, member of the committee of 18 on sanctions, suggested to that committee on Nov. 2, that oil, coal and iron be added to the list of commodities included in sanctions applied against Italy.

Last Sunday Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice and acting prime minister, issued a statement to the effect that Dr. Riddell had been expressing his own personal ideas and was not acting on instructions from his government when he made those proposals.

"Tonight's comment by the Prime Minister was his first on this subject. The delay of almost a month in issuing the corrective statement was due, he said, to the fact that the government was not seized at the time with the fact that the wrong impression had gone abroad.

"When sections of the press, not necessarily in Canada, had stressed the point that it was Canada's proposal," Mr. Mackenzie King said, "we thought it advisable to make it clear that it was the proposal of the committee of 18. The government will consider the proposal on its merits.

"There has been no change in our attitude toward sanctions since we announced on Oct. 29 last that we adhered to the sanctions proposals then advanced to all members by the League of Nations Co-ordinating Committee," Mr.

Ministerial Appointment Pending

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—A Canadian Minister to Washington will be appointed shortly, Prime Minister Mackenzie King declared tonight, but he could not say how soon, nor would he give any indication of who would be selected.

"There is not the same pressing need for a Minister now as there was a short time ago," the Prime Minister observed. He referred to the completion of the Canada-United States trade agreement which he signed in Washington Nov. 15 last.

The Canadian legation in Washington has been vacant since Hon. W. D. Herridge resigned immediately after the general elections on Oct. 14 when the Bennett Government was defeated. Mr. Herridge's resignation was accepted by the outgoing government.

Huma Wrong, Charge d'Affairs at the Canadian legation, has been carrying out the duties of Minister and has been suggested in some quarters as a possible successor to Mr. Herridge.

King said.

Some government officials would be assigned to replace Dr. Riddell on the committee of 18, the Prime Minister said, but it would not be, he thought, either Senator Raoul Dandurand or Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner in London. Senator Dandurand, a minister without portfolio and government leader in the Senate, is now in Europe and had been considered likely to go to Geneva.

Dr. Riddell is leaving for Chile where he will represent Canada at the International Labor Conference opening Jan. 2. He will be unable to attend the resumed meetings of the committee of 18 on Dec. 12.

"It would not like to say anything about Dr. Riddell," the Prime Minister replied when questioned as to the likelihood of the latter's return to Geneva. "I will wait until I have more information. He may have had good reasons for his actions."

Asked as to the powers of a member of the committee of 18 to speak his own mind without reference to his home government the Prime Minister said he thought that in such a circumstance the member should consult his government. In this case the action of the committee on oil sanctions was taken before the Dominion government knew anything about it.

Looking Forward To U.S. Election

(Battle lines are being drawn for a Presidential election next summer. The campaign promises to be one of the most bitterly fought in United States history. The question of the moment is: Who will the Republicans run against President Roosevelt? Five Republicans chiefly mentioned for the nomination and the basic situation, will be discussed in a series of five articles. This is the first.)

NEW YORK, Dec. (C.P.)—The most perplexing question in the United States today is: Who will race Roosevelt in 1936? One thing certain is the presidential nomination will be warily contested when the Republican convention is rapped to order next June. It is almost a year before the country goes to the polls yet the woods are already full of candidates.

In 1934 the privilege of running against the readily-smiling Franklin Delano Roosevelt would have been a doubtful honor. But the Republican Party now feels it has a better chance.

New Deal Slipping

The belief is built upon the premise that new deal popularity has skidded somewhat. Several legislative seats in New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey returned to the Republican fold in the November state elections. A national poll conducted by the American Institute of Public Opinion in October showed 53 of every 100 voters canvassed favored Roosevelt, as compared with the plurality of 59 per cent he won in the 1932 elections. A straw vote now being taken by the Literary Digest indicates an even more pronounced swing in sentiment.

The reason for the early drawing of battle lines by the G. O. is because the party is faced with the task of selecting one or more likely candidates for the presidency in time to build them up into figures of national stature.

The titular Republican leader, former President Herbert Hoover, is one of the many enigmas of the situation. He has given no inkling of whether he would choose to run if the party chose him as the runner.

Hoover In Action

In public addresses he has castigated Roosevelt and the Canadian-United States reciprocal trade treaty, the technical ground-work for which was laid by his administration. He has hit out at new deal spending and called for a return to the gold standard.

In his increasing political activity, some see Hoover reaching for the nomination. But the consensus of political writers is the Californian's chances of re-election were submerged when the boom times during his regime. Other outstanding candidates at the moment are:

Senator William E. Borah; Governor Landon of Kansas; publisher Frank Knox of Chicago and Senator Arthur Vandenberg. First choice would seem to lie somewhere in that group. But also in the running are another dozen, among them Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, son of the illustrious "Teddy," Senator Charles McNary, minority leader in the upper chamber, remembered in Canada as co-author of the McNary-Haugen tariff; Ogden Mills and Patrick Hurley, members of Hoover's former Cabinet; Frank Lowden, former Governor of Illinois.

Campaign Underway

The Republican campaign is already well under way from an oratorical standpoint and the tempo is steadily increasing. The plea being drummed into voters' ears is that they cast aside the Socialist and Communist theories which most good Republicans will tell you are hidden in the Rooseveltian cellar. It is charged control of Government is being centralized in Washington, that the new dealers are building a bureaucracy and that this will surely lead to dictatorship.

What is described as "governmental waste and extravagance" is another prime issue.

Right or wrong as those charges may be, the President's popularity is not what it once was, in the industrial east at least. Among like reasons for this are:

Scraping of the National Recovery Act by the United States Supreme Court on the grounds of unconstitutionality; the continuing parade of other legislation into the courts for legality testing; the Presidential promise of a balanced budget for 1936 that now appears difficult if not impossible of fulfillment.
