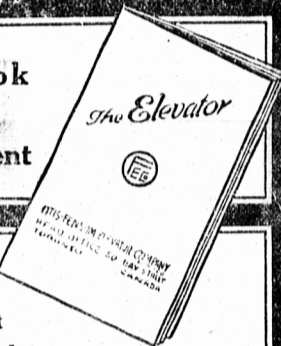

VISITING CLERGY.—Rev. Dr. Roche, assistant Editor of the Catholic Register and Canadian Church Extension, who recently returned from a tour of the world, arrived in Charlottetown, on Friday evening. He supplied at Iona on Sunday last, in the absence of the pastor, Father M. J. Smith, who was present at the ordination at Kelly's Cross. In the evening Rev. Dr. Roche gave an excellent lecture in Iona, on "The Church in Mission Lands." At Kinross on Sunday Father O'Brien, brother of Bishop O'Brien, of the Diocese of Ottawa, celebrated Mass, the pastor, Rev. John J. McDonald, being at the ordination at Kelly's Cross.

BOYS' WORK MOVEMENT.—Much interest in the movement that is sweeping Prince Edward Island for better things in boy life was stimulated at Hunter River by meetings which were held there during the last few days. On Friday evening a considerable number of boys held a banquet in the hall. A menu of delicacies was served by the ladies of the place. The program was opened by Mr. Angus Gillis, leading promoter of the affair, who introduced Mr. Wesley Steele, the Rural Boys' Secretary, who conducted a conference with the boys. Other out-of-town speakers whose addresses were well received were Messrs. Nelson McEwen and Albert Simpson, of Charlottetown. Among the local young men who spoke were Messrs. Gordon Brown, Bruce Brew and Harold McLean, of Hunter River, and Donald Campbell, of Brookfield. Rev. J. H. McHattie, of Brookfield, was also present and spoke words of encouragement. The speakers, some of whom had been delegates to the Boys' Conference, spoke in glowing terms of the interest in boy life which radiated from that gathering of boys from all parts of the province, and the splendid interest that the boys almost everywhere are showing in the better side of life, devoting themselves to the interests of young men in the organized Sunday school class, the Standard Efficiency Test which offers medals to boys who come up to standard in athletics and other tests that are applied for the development of the all-round life. On Sunday Mr. Steele visited Elliotts, Hunter River and Wheatley River, addressing large audiences in the last two named places in which he spoke of the spirit of the new movement and what it is accomplishing. It is predicted that the boys of Hunter River are soon to become interested enough to join their efforts to get some of the splendid activities started such as are meeting with success elsewhere.

ORCHARD PRUNING.—Mr. Michael Coughlin, who is at present engaged in orchard work, returned yesterday from Prince County where he was pruning orchards. He will leave this afternoon for Lot 48 to prune orchards near the Consolidated school. This is a very promising orchard and was set out by Mr. George McKenzie about eight years ago. Mr. Rainer purchased the farm last year and hopes to make the orchard one of his most profitable lines of farming.

(Continued from page two.) of the British race. Said an aged back-seller to him: "We always used to be told you English people had no friends; but I find the reason is that you don't want them because you have so many brothers." It is this sentiment of brotherhood among all who acknowledge the British Union Jack that the Overseas Club is seeking to foster and develop in both the Homeland and the Dominions beyond the seas.

Parliament has adjourned for the Whitsun recess of a fortnight, during which period it is hoped that seaside and moorland breezes may induce reflection which will bring politicians back to London in a determined spirit to solve the most abstruse problem that Parliament has faced for a century.

Derby Day, the great sporting event of the year which attracts attention even from those whom the language of the turf is unknown, did not fail to draw its crowds this year. The race for three-year-old colts was in itself a disappointment to the public since neither the favorite Kinnymore, nor the King's colt, Brakespear, were the winners, the blue ribbon going to a French-bred colt owned by an American. But it was a popular derby. The King and Queen were there, and the precautions against Suffragette attempts prevented any regrettable incident such as that which marred last year's race. It was a cold but fine day, and one noticed that the methods of reaching Epsom indicated more wealth on the part of those who attended than in years past. One of the sights of the day was the homeward procession of the Derby crowd, for the endless variety of vehicles is most striking. A coach and four with liveried attendants is found blocked up by a donkey cart containing an east-end coster and his wife, and behind the coach may be a grocer's delivery cart. This year, however, as one writer noted, almost the only place where horses were seen was on the race-courses; on the road the motor-car or automobile was almost generally used for traction purposes. Yet from the racing point of view it is certain that motor-car racing can never become as popular with the crowd as horse-racing. It is the individuality of the horse that pleases the Britisher, and for this reason the "noble animal" is not likely to become extinct through the introduction of mechanical traction.

The big feature of the Canada Club Dinner which was held on Thursday, 28th inst., was the presence of H. S. H. the Prince Alexander of Teck, who sat at the right hand of the chair, man, Sir William Osler, Bart. Replying to the toast of the Dominion and the Governor-General, Prince Alexander expressed his pleasure at this meeting Canadians collectively for the first time since his appointment to succeed the Duke of Connaught. Concluding a review of Canada's commercial, agricultural and industrial conditions, the Governor-General promised to use every endeavor to adhere to those high traditions which his predecessors had established, and to work wholeheartedly for the good of the Dominion.

The remarks of Sir William Osler were interesting in as much as he took a determined stand in regard to maintaining Canada as a white man's country. Although Hindus must be recognized as fellow subjects of the Empire, he held that one country had the right to decline to admit them as denizens of that country; in fact, Sir William took the position that a surgeon does when he decides that in the interests of the general bodily health, one member must be amputated. Pity for the minor injury must not be allowed to result in more serious hurt to the greater real. Sir William caused some merriment by his diagnosis of the complaint from which Canada is now suffering, which he pronounced to be over prosperity, or plethora of prosperity. But like a discreet physician, he pointed out the bright side of things and reminded his audience that if Canada was suffering some set-back, in natural prosperity there was no corresponding set-back, but the reverse, in regard to intellectual progress, and in this connection he paid a tribute to the high standard maintained by certain Canadian publications.

On the day of mailing this letter the Canadian colony in London is under a cloud, for in the noonday hours the news broke of the disaster to the Empress of Ireland. As happened on a former tragic occasion in the history of maritime disaster, the
