The many friends of Mr. Robert Clemens, Upper Hillsboro Street, will regret to learn that he is seriously ill.

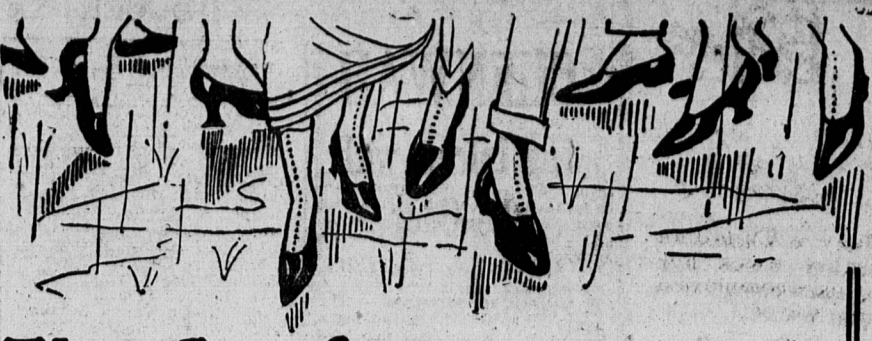

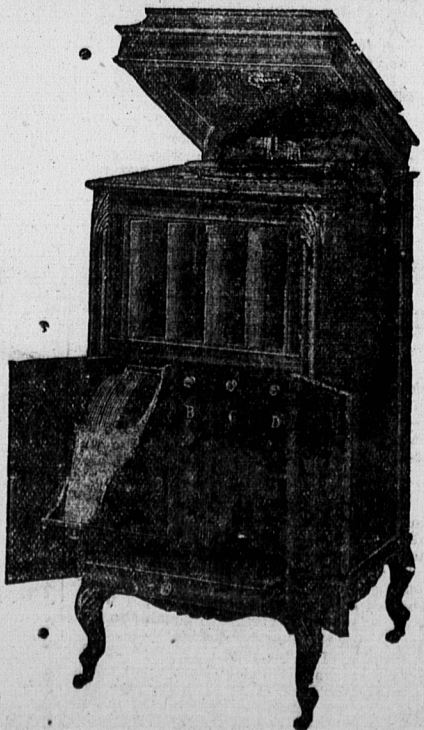

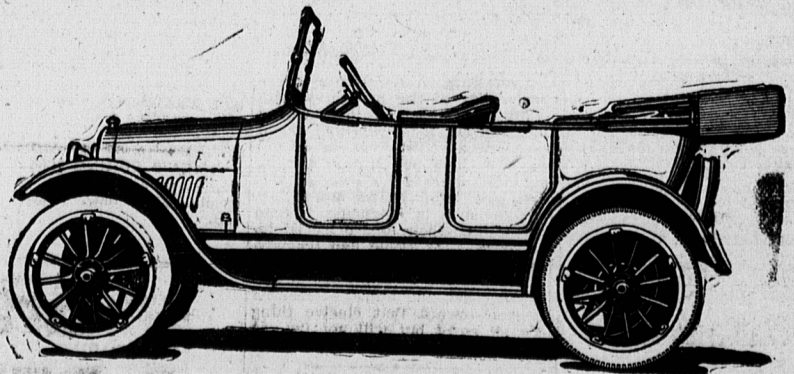
