"When we think of defence," Mr. Davis said, "let's think also of health and strength and when think of Christmas Seals. They are just as vital as tanks and guns. What amazes me most is the ignorance of this dear little tuberculosis germ and its annual toll of human lives."

"Everyone this year should give especially because of the effect of the war on tuberculosis. The hardship of war reduces human resistance and gives the germ more strength. Tuberculosis associations bring into use many means of fighting the disease through the Christmas Seal fund."

The Plan of Battle Against Inflation

(By Frederick Griffin)

In a business block on Sparks Street, Ottawa, final plans are being worked out for the war's greatest domestic offensive. It is an immense planning against time. The zero hour is December 1st. We are all going for the top unless rising prices. For every person in Canada will be in this tight to beat inflation. It is a fight that we Canadians must win for ourselves and our survivors.

We must win it by severe discipline. We must win it by changing business practices. We must win it by turning our backs on our habits. We must win it by beating greed. That, men say here at Ottawa headquarters, is the only way to win. For each man must make himself his own judge and his neighbor's keeper.

It can't be won, they say, by the government. It can only be won by the people themselves, by you and me determining not to chisel or cheat. By you and me foregoing the temptation of an immediate seeming profit. It will be one of a hundred thousand such profits that will bring ruin in the long run to us and all.

This offensive is being planned by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board under Donald Gordon. It is to be no sudden, sharp, exhilarating attack at dawn. December 1st, you won't hear the whistles blow, see flags fly. It will be just another day, with little visible change in our way of life. But on slow, ponderous, unrelenting pincers movement will have begun to stop price increases. It will go on through countless nights every day until the war's real shot is fired.

But, while the aim is to set up a siege against inflation, preparations in Ottawa are as for a blitz. At headquarters here the general staff is working far into the night laying the ground for a nation-wide assault that will involve every corner grocery, every quick lunch counter, every little hairdressing salon.

For from this date no one will be able to charge or pay more for any goods or essential services than the highest prices that prevailed in the four weeks, September 10 to October 11. If prices have gone up since, they must come down.

Viewed close-up here, that is what makes the task seem such a colossal one. It is the honesty and cooperation. The Board is not simply setting one price or set of prices down the line for a formula by the Board, in a country like Canada of a thousand trading freedoms—how?

Two or three weeks passed in a general strike of the ground up. Then Donald Gordon, the virile Scots-Canadian banker, who had made such a success of another war necessity, Foreign Exchange Control, was drafted for the job of organizing and launching the new price control set-up. What a task! He had to build a national organization from the ground up. Without precedent, he had to create new checks on all business. He had to fashion, for Canadians, a new world. He had to devise a control that would curb equally the great corporate merchant and the pushcart pedlar.

It was a job to make a man quail. But Gordon, big physically, cheerful, dynamic and inspiring, ruthless when necessary, tackled it and is putting it across. Since business men told him it couldn't be done. He said, "Boys, it's got to be done." And they went out cheerfully to do it. That, as I said, is the secret of the success which is being achieved over the impossible. Business men, the idea sold to them by Gordon, are working it out with him.

Ottawa headquarters is athrob with an energy that is reaching out into the city streets and byways of the Dominion's business. A great organization is being built up almost overnight. In little more than a month the miracle will have been achieved, the creation of an organization as remarkable in its war as the Empire Air Training Plan. Truly this country, under war's stress, has shown a titanic capacity to improvise.

NEW CHAIRMAN

Donald Gordon, deputy-governor of the Bank of Canada, is the new chairman of the wartime prices and trade board. He was assistant chairman for two weeks prior to his most recent appointment announced at Ottawa.

United States policy: there was no attempt to establish an "overall ceiling" which is the essence of the present policy.

Thus for two years, while the cost of living rose, wages increased, prices went slowly but steadily up, and one transactions of daily business and prices began to move in a vicious spiral towards infinity. The time had come for drastic action.

Announcement of action came on October 10th, when in a radio broadcast the Prime Minister declared that wages and prices would be pegged in an all-out fight to halt inflation. Such a thing in such fashion had never been attempted in a democratic country before. Could it be done? Could the tide be stopped? How, in a democracy, could the ten million and one transactions of daily business be channelled and checked? Easy enough in a dictatorship like Germany, which can decree the shape of a haircut and see it enforced by the Gestapo! But in a country like Canada of a thousand trading freedoms—how?
