P.E.I. Development Commission

Mr. W. P. Callaghan reported to the Development Commission as follows: I am asked by the chairman of the sub-committee on new industries to write a short article on the growing and canning of small fruits, vegetables etc. I believe this to be one of the very important questions that this commission will have to deal with in as much as it has not been given very much attention in the past. Canned goods are now in great demand and will be in a greater demand and command higher prices before the war is over. To meet the costs of this war it is necessary that our savings should be doubled here in Canada, which will mean the exercise of an economy to an extent which has not been practised in the past. We must realize the pressing necessity that exists for economy and retrenchment and that for many years to come the strictest economy must characterize the administration of this country. In the first place we believe the encouragement of the growing of small fruits and vegetables by every farmer in Prince Edward Island and the establishing of canning stations, where they could be marketed without the cost of transportation being too high, should be taken up at once. There are yet here on Prince Edward Island thousands of acres where wild berries are grown that costs nothing to expect the labor of gathering, and are going to waste for the reason that there are no establishments conveniently located to take care of them. The wild strawberry which is perhaps the best wild fruit in existence, is ripe about the first of July, next comes the raspberry and after that the blue berry. Now to get back to the culture of garden strawberries. We do not know very much about it, but we believe that if the farmers were educated to cultivate a small plot of these, it would be a great source of revenue. We are informed by a gentleman, who is engaged in the industry here and has kept an account of the profits per acre, that the profits are over 200 per cent, the figures are as follows, per preparation of land, ploughing, fertilizing, manuring, hoes, packing & etc., not cost over \$250.00 per acre, the average crop per acre would be about 8000 boxes at 10 cents per box, \$800.00, leaving a net profit per acre of \$550.00. If berries sold at only 6 cents per box, it would still be a paying proposition. If every farmer on Prince Edward Island had only a quarter of an acre of strawberries, it would be the province an enormous profit, and when the Car Ferry starts, shipments to the United States could be made in carload lots, any surplus fresh, which could not be marketed here, could be put up at the canneries.

The growing of vegetables for canning purposes should be more valuable than the growing of fruit. Every year we are importing to this province thousands of dollars worth of peas, beans, corn, etc., which can be grown here, particularly peas and beans cheaper than they can be grown in the eastern provinces. Beans retailing at 6 cents per lb, should be grown here for the farmers of Prince Edward Island to get into this industry at once, as it has been proven that this country is well adapted for the growing of beans and if once properly started would bring not only thousands but hundreds of thousands of dollars into their pockets. growing of beans should be taken up for the following reasons: first, they are legumes and do not exhaust the soil of its nitrogen, second, they can be threshed and graded during the winter season, when there is little work to do on the farm, third, they are always a cash crop, and fourth, they grow well on both sandy and clay loams and bean straw as a fodder for stock is almost equal to clover hay. We would also suggest that the commission take into consideration the experimenting of the culture of sugar beets. Canada imports six hundred and fifty million pounds of sugar annually. Ontario has successfully grown sugar beets. The average production per acre grown in Ontario is only nine tons, which sold at \$5.82 per ton, this certainly leaves a good profit. The two great beet producing countries of the world, France and Germany, encouraged the industry by paying a bounty of so much per ton to the farmers for the growing of the beet. France as far back as 1893 paid premiums to both farmers and manufacturers to encourage the growing and manufacture of the sugar beet. It has been proven that sugar extracted from beets is equal to sugar extracted from the sugar cane. With a large sugar refinery, as near to us as St. John, N. B., if it can be ascertained that the soil and climate of this province is adapted for the growing of sugar beets, this is one of the big things for this commission to take up. The beet seed can be successfully grown here and we have a home market for sugar for years to come.
