For The Eastern Inspectorate—Fifteen Dollars in Prizes.

The prizes will be awarded to Grades IV, V and VI, three prizes to each grade. The first prizes will be worth \$2.50 each, the second worth \$1.50 each and the third worth \$1.00 each. The competition opens October 1st 1901 and closes June 15th 1902. Pupils are not limited as to the number of maps they exhibit and may draw maps of any countries they wish. The name of school and teacher, age, grade name and address of pupil competing must accompany each pupil's specimens. It is to be hoped that every school in the Eastern Inspectorate District will compete for those elegant prizes.
