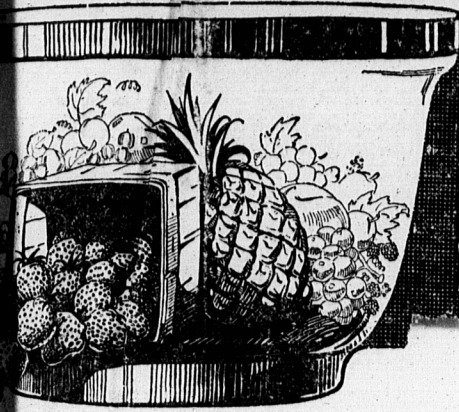

Crushed Strawberry Jam
For the jam it is necessary that each berry be broken before crushing. Measure 2 quarts ripe berries in separate dishes, so that each berry is mashed. This allows the juice to be absorbed during the short boil. Add 4 level cups (2 lbs.) crushed berries into large saucepan and add 7 level cups (3 lbs.) sugar and mix well. Use fire and stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil for one full minute, remove from fire and stir until cool slightly. Then pour quickly. If in open jars seal at once. If in jars seal at once and in 30 minutes to sterilize the tops.

Pineapple and Strawberry Jam
Crush well about 1 qt. ripe berries. Put pineapple in food chopper or chop very fine. Measure 2 level cups (1 lb.) of each into large kettle. Add 7 level cups (3 lbs.) sugar and mix well. Use hottest fire and stir constantly before and while boiling. Boil hard for 1 minute, remove from fire and stir in 1/2 bottle (scant 1/2 cup) Certo. Skim and pour quickly.
