AUSTRIAN TEAM BEATS CANADA

First Defeat Sustained by Touring Canadians in Twenty-five Games.

(Canadian Press Cable Via Reuters) VIENNA, Austria, Feb. 7.—The Austrian National hockey team defeated the Canadians of Toronto by one to none in a match tonight. It was the first defeat sustained by the Canadians in twenty five matches throughout Europe in the past few weeks, but the match was played in a heavy downpour of rain. The Canadian team is engaged in the world's amateur ice hockey championships at Berlin next week.

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When Max Schmeling gave Paulino Uccudun a thorough beating throughout the entire fifteen rounds of their bout in New York City last June, many an expert laid a bet on the hairy chest of the Basque's big time ring career. True it was that the Deutschland Dempsey did not knock Paulino off his feet, but he did give him such a gruesome lacing that the golden-toothed forester from the Pyrenees looked as though his future amusement would feature cutting up paper instead of cutting down trees. However, from the days of ancient Rome, the Basques have been listed among the hardest of all people and Paulino certainly is one of the hardest of all Basques. An Uccudun quit after a Schmeling slaughter? Non! Non! The Pyrenean cave-man has always claimed his left arm was "ver bad" because of an old injury during the Schmeling bombardment. Physicians did treat him for such an arm trouble. After a month or two, the scarred,

shaggy ol' Bezarck returned to the wars and for a tuncup took on the redoubtable Ambrose "Tuffy Griffith" in a ten rounded at Chicago. It was a torrid tilt, "Tuffy" winning largely because of an early lead. Despite that admirable come-back effort, it certainly looked as though Paulino were being led to a worse than a Schmeling slaughter when he was matched to tear into the much-feared Otto von Porat. The gamey wood-chopper did that, clearly winning eight of the ten rounds and definitely punching the Norseman from the ranks of top flight heavies. Now the battered and battering Basque is on the books to fight the semi-final to the Sharkey-Scott bout at Miami. If sheer courage and extraordinary stamina were the sole qualifying essentials, you could lay your all on the line that the hard-bitten Bezarck would be plugging away in the star bout there. In the heart area Scott doesn't class with the Basque, and we won-

der if Sharkey does at all times! In fight-to-a-finish times, Paulino—would still be tough enough to be a bright title prospect. He's a Bat Nelson heavy if ever there was one. "Uzzy" is just getting under steam when the other fellow tires. And he will spoil many a Von Porat unless he completely collapses within a year or two. Recently the veteran Billy Gibson took over Paulino's management, to the indignation of the Spanish-American trio that had been handling his affairs for years. Gibson piloted both Benny Leonard and Gene Tunney to the heights and then they retired. Perhaps "Wise Ol' Will" can work wonders with Paulino. He surprised the fans with that Von Porat upset. That was just the start. He may bob up even higher. By next Summer the Sport Bug would like to see Paulino clash with Johnny Risko for—shall we call it?—the "spoiler" heavyweight championship.

Maritimers Entered For Speed Skating Championships Being Held In Ottawa In Connection With Winter Carnival.

MONCTON, N. B., Feb. 7.—Contestants from the Maritimes are entered for the Speed Skating Championships, being held in Ottawa in connection with the Winter Carnival there. St. John and Moncton are among the entries. These follow upon the triumphant climax of the International Dog Derby at the Carnival Ball in the Chateau Laurier when His Excellency the Governor General presented the Canadian National Railways Gold Challenge Cup to Emil St. Goddard, the victorious musher of The Pas, and second, and third prizes to Earl Brydges of Cranberry Portage and Loford Seppala, Nome, Alaska. Entries for the Speed Skating in addition to St. John and Moncton included New York, Lake Placid, Cleveland, Chicago, Detroit, Toronto, Montreal and other centres. These will contend for the North American Ladies Championship and unofficially the world's, and for the men's Canadian Championship. There are 110 entries, 33 of which are senior men and 20 senior women. Among the contestants are Jack Shea, Lake Placid, International Champion; Ross Robinson, Toronto, Canadian Champion; Valentine Bialis and Irving Jaffree of the American Olympic Team; Percy Johnston, Toronto, International Indoor Champion; Lloyd Guenther, Michigan, Michigan State Champion; Melvin Johnson, Detroit, Wilfred Flack, Toronto sprinter; Alex Hurd, Toronto runner up for the Canadian Championship; Loretta Noitzel, Detroit, International Women's Champion; Lela Brooks Potter, Toronto, former International Champion; Rose Marie Brady, Michigan State Champion; Jean Wilson, Toronto; Elizabeth Dubois, Illinois State Champion; Elsa Mueller, American Indoor Champion; Pattie Donaldson, Toronto. Swimming championships will also take place.

Trainers Quit When Graham Won't Give Up His Place.

OXFORD ROWING LONDON, Feb. 7.—The Oxford crew has met with a mishap at the most vital stage of their training campaign for the great boat race with Cambridge, which takes place at the end of March. The dark blues, who have lost the past six races, are now back on even terms with Cambridge, each having won 40 of the contests.

Disagreement with President Alastair Graham of the Oxford University Boat Club led to the resignation of Oxford's three coaches, Dr. Mallam, Major Wiggins and A. S. Garton. Graham insisted that he retain a place in the crew. He is adamant in his resolution and is within his rights, being in sole charge of the crew and training. The president appoints the coaches, which makes the disagreement all the more surprising.

The incident receives some unfavorable comment, though the Star applauds Graham as the type of man which makes great leaders. The Star considers Graham the best man for the bow or No. 7, where he has been rowing. Coaches, however, think J. Timne, a brother of the famous 1912 Oxford blue, is a more suitable man for the place. But Graham, says the Star, "introduced drama into this year's race. He has only to go on and win to confound the critics, Wellington, Roberts, Haig and others have done such things; why not Graham?"
