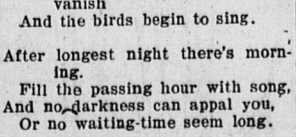

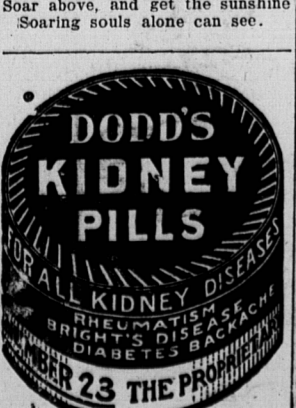
On the darkest day of winter We can sense the coming spring. Some day, cold and gloom will vanish And the birds begin to sing.

PROTEST PLAN TO GIVE YAP ISLAND TO JAPS

WASHINGTON, March 23.—A resolution asking President Wilson for information as to the recent announcement by the British Foreign Minister that the island of Yap, in the Pacific Ocean, was to be given to Japan, was adopted yesterday by the Senate without debate. It was offered by Senator Lodge the Republican leader, who presented a letter from John Ford, secretary of the American Asiatic Association, expressing hope that Congress would unite in a protest against the administration of the island passing into other hands than those of the United States.

SAYS PROHIBITION APPALLING EVIL

Prof. Leacock Has Set England Thinking and Public Opinion Runs Strong.

LONDON, March 24.—Professor Stephen Leacock of McGill University had a long letter yesterday in the Times in which he discusses "the appalling disaster" which has overtaken the United States and Canada in prohibition. He spoke of the prohibitionist as now having entered into his kingdom and claims that his enjoyment is merely the joy of persecuting his fellow men. He further warns England that a similar crusade is coming to England and says:

"The most serious warning is needed for the decent British people of any class who may be thinking of migrating to the United States and to the dry provinces of Canada. They will read nothing but bitter regrets. Let them come instead to the spacious and hospitable province of Quebec."

A GRASSHOPPER PLAGUE EXPECTED

Prof. F. W. Broderick, entomologist at the Manitoba Agricultural College said today that the predicted plague depends on the weather conditions. Millions of eggs were hatched last summer in the districts in South-Western Manitoba, Southern Saskatchewan, and Alberta, he declared. Warm dry weather at an early period will tend to bring about the hatching of these millions of eggs into lively hoppers, while on the other hand if the weather is first warm, and then followed by frost and damp the young ones may be all killed off.
