Caledonia Man Hears From the "Spanish Prisoner"

Evidently the "Spanish prisoner" swindling game is going on merrily yet, despite the many times it has been shown up in the press through out Canada and United States. The following "touching" letter, received by Mr. M. M. Stewart, postmaster at Caledonia, is in apparently the same handwriting (or lithographed from a copy of the same) as many similar communications received by business men here with in the past year. It bears the postmark "Barcelona, Spain" and is dated March 21, 1924. Mr. Stewart forwarded the letter to the Guardian for publication for the purpose of warning others throughout the country.

Barcelona, 21.3.24

Dear Sir:— Being imprisoned here by bankruptcy, I ask you to help me to obtain a sum of 360,000 dollars I have in America being necessary to come here to raise the seizure of my baggage paying to the Register of the Court the expenses of my trial and recover my portmanteau containing a secret pocket where I have hidden two checks payable to bearer for that sum. As reward I will give up to you the third part, viz. 120,000 dollars. I cannot receive your answer in the prison, but you can send a cablegram to a person of my confidence who will deliver it me, addressed as follows:

Jose Mas Lista Corrosos 1624 Sitges, Spain Inform, Stewart

Awaiting your answer to instruct you all my secret, I only sign now, R.

First of all, answer by cable, not by letter.

ST. PETER'S MISSION.—Father Bickersteth of the Community of the Resurrection, Mirfield, England who is to hold a mission in St. Peter's Cathedral early next month, is a son of Bishop Bickersteth who wrote fourteen of the hymns in the Anglican Hymn Book. It is interesting to note that Bishop Gore, of Oxford, one of the leading lights in the Anglican Church, was founder of the Community of the Resurrection. The Rev. Dr. Frere, who is also a member of this Community, has lately been made Bishop of Truro, England. He has recently been appointed by the Archbishop of Canterbury on a Committee to carry on conversations with the dissenters, looking towards a reunion of these bodies with the Anglican Church.

SUDDEN DEATH AT VERNON RIVER.—The body of Mr. John A. McMillan, aged 67, unmarried, of Vernon River, was found outside his house near the wood pile on Monday morning where he had been at work. His arms were extended over a log and the axe clutched in his hand. Dr. Collins held a post mortem examination and pronounced death to be due from apoplexy. The late Mr. McMillan had disposed of his farm some years ago to the Tweedy brothers who had allowed him to remain in his own house where he has since been living alone. He was last seen on Friday when he was apparently in good health and spirits. He was not seen since and on a search being made by Messrs. Irving and Weldon Tweedy found the body as described above. The funeral took place this morning from the residence of Mrs. Cephas B. Tweedy to the St. Joachim's Catholic Cemetery. Mr. McMillan was a very friendly and genial man who had held the position of road overseer for some years. He has no immediate relatives on the Island. He had one brother in Pennsylvania who was last heard of several years ago.
