THE WEATHER.—The cold snap continued all day yesterday the mercury registering 8 below at the local meteorological station early in the morning and 7 below at sunset. Towards night, after the sky had clouded somewhat the temperature began to rise and at 9 o'clock was at 5 below. The mercury may rise above the cipher mark today and a snow-storm is predicted.

TONIGHT'S MATCH

It seems as if old to visit the local Arena different evenings and see the scores of young men, most of whom range from fifteen to eighteen years of age, taking part in the healthy muscle and brain developing game of the puck. Just as the province is noted for raising fast horses, so it is noted for raising fast hockey players. It used to be said that when hockey was mentioned in a conversation on the Mainland, that P. E. Island was invariably mentioned because the Island sent them such good players as Gregory Williams, Music Murphy, Rattenbury, McDonald, Campbell, McGrath, and several others of more or less ability.

This evening there will be a "revival" of the game in the Arena between some of the fastest skaters and stick handlers that has ever assembled on local ice—players of the Island and Chester Campbell, two brothers who have a large following among as lovers of clean hockey, well played. Percy Rodd, George Buntain and J. Power, who when let loose on a pond of ice together can almost carry that piece of rubber wherever they wish, Rodd has been associated with the game for several years, and when it comes to strategy and stick play, he stands out conspicuously. Will Prowse and Carl Milford, who will tend to the "Points" division of the game have been playing hockey for many years, and when their record is looked up it will be seen that neither of them spent many seconds on the "boards" but on the other hand played the game in a gentlemanly way. The good tender for tonight's game, Mr. Charles Prowse, will experience his first winter of senior hockey, but from his previous work he may be relied upon to guard the nets, fearlessly and well. There are several younger men who will relieve the regulars during the game, and in Bryenton the "Millionaires" have a player when developed fit to take the place of a senior, as he is both a good and fairly fast skater, Weson Whitlock, Earl Lane and John McEachern, make up the balance of the team, three fast skaters and generally good players especially the latter, who when acquiring more weight will make a player of the first line. Sum-merside's line up will consist of twelve men most of whom have been tried and found "up to the test" in every angle of the game.

HIGH PRICES FOR PRODUCE.—Mr. B. Carter, the genial auctioneer, reports that excellent prices are being obtained at the various sales throughout the country. At the recent auction sale at the Cass Farm, North River, cattle brought from \$125 to \$205 each, calves from 3 months to 6 months brought \$40 to \$80 and \$1.25 was paid for oats. At the Robertson sale, St. Peter's Road, the farm of 56 acres, sold for \$2,550, oats brought \$1.17 a bushel, horses \$134, cattle \$35 to \$85, pigs 35c a pound live weight, hay \$23 a ton, straw \$11 a ton and implements and furniture bringing correspondingly high prices.
