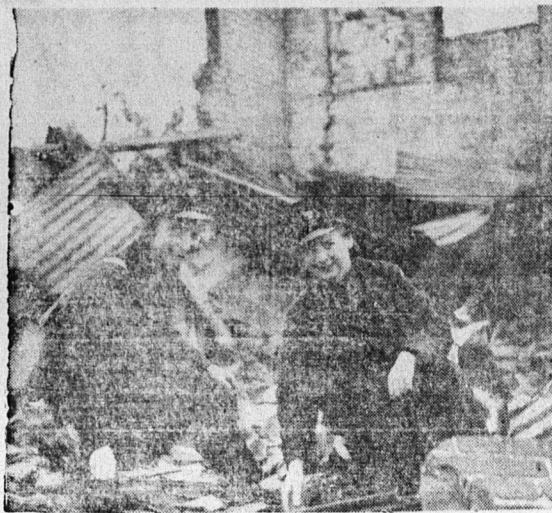


Medals For Bravery Given Girl Workers



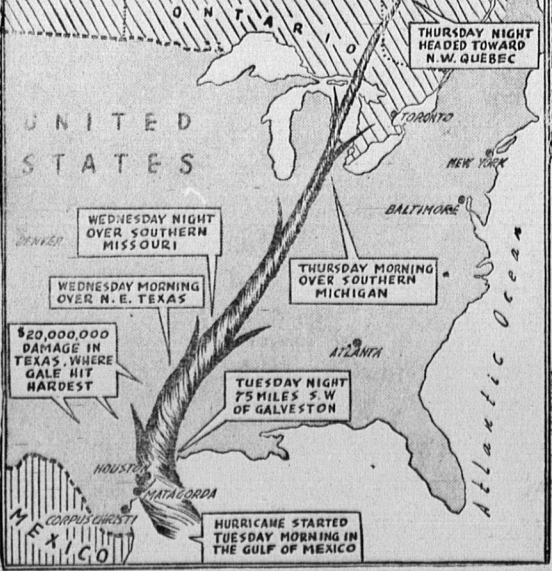

Reviews Federal Wartime Record

Partisanship and Vacillation of King Government Scored by Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan

A feature of the annual meeting of the Queen's County Conservative Association on Thursday night was the stirring address given by the provincial leader, Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan.

All over Canada, Dr. MacMillan declared, there is a feeling that the Conservative party must be strengthened. It is recognized that a most unhappy state of affairs exists. This great Confederation is most in need today of a strong, virile government, which will not attempt any measures for political expediency.

Another cabinet minister, the speaker recalled, was involved in transactions which were the subject of nation-wide criticism and the public demands his removal. He was taken out of the Defense Ministry and given another portfolio, because he had too many political friends to be fired.

Most Disgraceful Episode "I don't think Mackenzie King himself should ever be forgiven for the decision of his Government in 1938 on the British air training scheme," said Dr. MacMillan.

Ignoring Conservatives Dr. MacMillan referred to the recent visit here of the former Conservative leader, Hon. Dr. McMillan. He was making an inspection of auxiliary war services.

R.C.A.F. Plane Makes forced Landing in U. S.

GREENLAND, N.H., Oct. 2.—(CP)—The crash landing in early morning darkness of a twin-engine Royal Canadian Air Force bomber, loaded with racks carrying medium bombs, was termed "near miracle" today by witnesses.

The plane had lost its way returning to its Canadian base after a flight that apparently had carried it over the Atlantic. It landed 150 miles southeast of the nearest point on the Canadian border and more than 200 miles southeast of the New Brunswick boundary where it adjoins northern Maine.

THOMAS JAMES WIGGINTON There passed away from our midst, September 15th, Thomas James Wigginton, born at Crapau, May 1st, 1863. He was the son of Thomas Wigginton and Jane Banford Canfield. His five sisters and two brothers all predeceased him. In 1889 he married Lucy Rachel Smith of Kingston, by whom he had one daughter and two sons, Irene, Boston, Mass., Wallace of Red Willow, Alta., and Lorne at home.

Mr. Wigginton came to Dundas 80 years ago and, like other hardy pioneers in this province, heved his now fine farm from the virgin forest. Until a month of his death, he was a worker of amazing energy, and interested in everything that concerned the welfare of his home and of the community about him. No one could be more interested in the church, and particularly the young people under his care. He loved work among the children in the Sunday School, and was a teacher for over 50 years. He drew his Bible and had an uncommon gift for imparting its truth to others. He was a leader of the Christian Endeavour Society for about 20 years, and was its mainstay.

It can be truly said of him that as a citizen and a member of the Christian Church, he had to an unusual degree, the respect and love of all who knew him. He is one whose place will be hard to fill. The funeral service was held on Sunday, Sept. 22nd, at 10 o'clock in the morning, at the Dundas United Church, and the service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. H. Green, assisted by the Rev. Sidney Hurd of the Baptist Church. Before the service closed the congregation stood for a minute's silent thanksgiving to God for the service rendered to community and the church by the deceased. Plan boost in Vitamin content Of white bread

OTTAWA, Oct. 2.—(CP)—White bread containing more of the high vitamins of Canada's wheat will probably be on sale in all major cities of Canada before the New Year, agriculture department officials said today. Dr. Newman, dominion cerealist, said investigations conducted during the past 12 months to see if more vitamins could be retained in white bread had shown that loaves could be produced with from 350 to 400 international units per pound of B-1 vitamin compared with only about 150 units in ordinary white bread. While ordinary white flour has only 150 international units, bran and shorts used for feeding pigs and dairy cattle may contain upwards of 3,000 international units, an official said. In the new flour, obtained by changes in milling processes, humans will enjoy some of the essential foods which have been shown to fit only for animals," he added.
