MR. JOHN HORNE

After a short illness, another well known resident of Winsloe, Mr. John Horne passed peacefully away on the 19th of March. A man well and favorably known, not only in this Province, but Dominion-wide as a successful farmer and business man, whose word was as good as his bond, a familiar figure about our city streets, always a lover and owner of beautiful horses, and imbibed in his sons the desire to carry on the work that interested him. Though a man of 75 he retained an active interest in all things up to his last illness. The funeral service was held from his old home in Winsloe on the 21st where the beautiful burial service of the Church of England was read by Rev. Mr. Johnson, Rector of St. John's Church, at Milton assisted by Rev. Mr. Grant, Winsloe United Church. Despite the bad roads a

The funeral of the late Horatio Nelson, who died recently in Boston, was held on Wednesday at Montague, the body having arrived on the Island last Monday evening accompanied by Mrs. Nelson, her son Horace, and Miss Anna Nelson, sister of the deceased. The body was taken to the home of Mr. Nelson's son, Mr. Guy Nelson, and was viewed there by hundreds of friends.

In the afternoon it was removed to the United Church, where services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Stirling, assisted by Rev. Mr. Williams, of the Baptist Church, and Rev. Mr. Stiff of the Church of Christ.

Mr. Stirling paid an eloquent tribute to the memory of Mr. Nelson, referring to his exemplary character as a Christian gentleman and his long and useful career as one of the most highly honoured and respected residents of Montague.

During the impressive service, a quartette from the choir sang "Take the name of Jesus with you."

Burial was in the Lower Montague Cemetery, the body being followed to its last resting place by a very large number of people.
