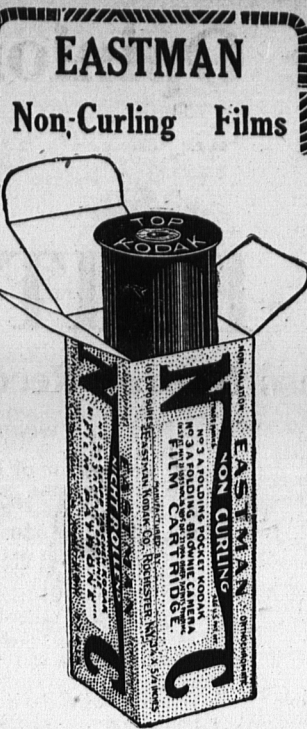

CANADA COULD TURN OUT MORE MUNITIONS YET.

MONTREAL, Aug. 27.—D. A. Thomas, the British munitions expert, who is touring Canada in connection with the orders placed by the British Government, said: "There is no question," "but that at the present moment there are more eighteen-pounder shells being made than can be made into fixed rounds, which is what the British Government want today. I cannot go into any details as to whether the powder manufacturers and those who are making the other parts of shells are turning out the limit of their supply, or whether any other steps are being taken to augment the quantities and the fixing of the shells. But I am satisfied the capacity of Canada for producing munitions has not been fully utilized, and I am certainly going to urge the British Government to continue their orders and increase them."
"We have the question of loading or fixing the shells fully in view, but it is obvious I cannot say anything about the work in detail."

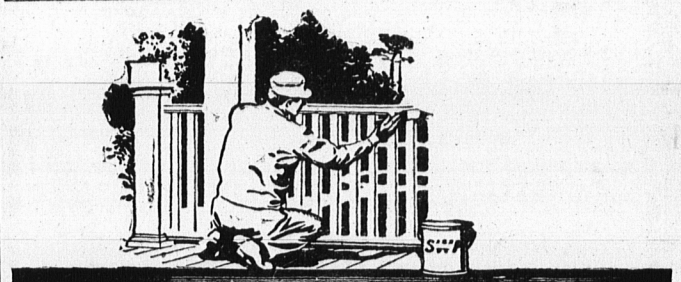
