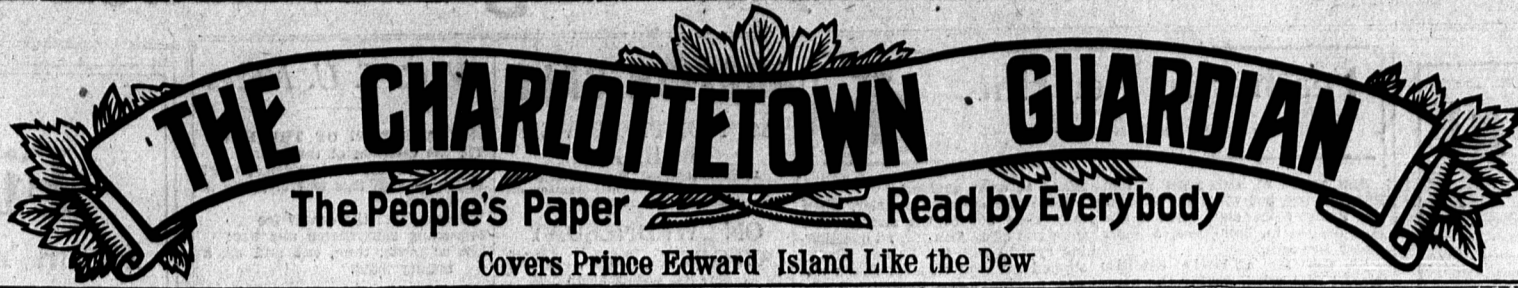

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BENNETT WAVE SWEEPING ALL CANADA

Ontario Hails Bennett's Tour With Enthusiasm

Empire Trade Issue Stressed By Prime Minister At Rousing Campaign Meeting At Owen Sound.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

OWEN SOUND, Oct. 11.—When he had laid his reciprocal preference proposals before the British government at the 1930 Imperial Conference, Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas had described them as "humbly." Prime Minister Bennett told a political meeting here tonight, "But when those same proposals were agreed upon in 1932 Mr. Thomas (who was Secretary of State for the Dominions) was there and there is no warmer supporter of those agreements than he," said Mr. Bennett.

The Prime Minister during the course of his outline of benefits to Canadians arising from the 1932 agreements was asked, "What did Mr. Thomas say in 1930?" Mr. Bennett said he had no hesitation in answering.

Tonight's meeting, held in the interests of Victor C. Porteous, Conservative candidate in Grey North, marked the end of Mr. Bennett's Western Ontario campaign.

LEAGUE LIFTS ARMS EMBARGO TO ETHIOPIA

Nations Take Initial Steps In Applying Sanctions — H a't Shipments to Italy.

GENEVA, Oct. 11.—The League of Nations today took the first step in the application of sanctions against Italy by imposing a general arms embargo on that country and lifting all restrictions on the flow of arms and ammunition to Ethiopia.

Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, one of the Canadian delegates to the League, moved in the committee of 18 that this step be taken. The committee, formed to expedite the problem of handling sanctions, approved and then the large coordinating committee agreed.

The arms embargo on Ethiopia was lifted by a League members' vote, including Germany, the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Paraguay, El Salvador, Albania and Italy. Only Hungary and Albania opposed the move in the coordinating committee. Austria did not declare her position.

Seeks Prompt Action
Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner to London, called for prompt action in applying sanctions during discussion of the resolution.

"Let's do it quickly, or nothing at all can be done," he said. Besides naming the committee of 18, with Canada as a member, the coordinating committee of all members of the League Assembly, except Italy and Ethiopia, appointed a sub-committee of seven to study the possibility of a financial boycott against Italy.

A resolution adopted by the large group recommended that any League state restricting the shipment of arms to Ethiopia should immediately lift such an embargo.

The League will aid Emperor Haile Selassie to arm his poorly equipped warriors but will hinder Premier Mussolini from replenishing his munitions needs from foreign markets. Haile Selassie has repeatedly protested against an arms embargo upon his country, pointing out that Ethiopia has no munitions factories, while Italy has several.

Contracts Void
The arms embargo against Italy applies not only to new sales but also to any contracts already entered into to supply implements of war to the Fascists.

The resolution is so framed as to block any Italian attempts to gain munitions through sympathetic neighboring states, such as Austria. A paragraph says mem-

50 Dead, 300 Injured In Earthquake

MOSCOW, Oct. 11.—Meagre dispatches reaching Moscow late tonight said 50 persons were killed and 300 injured in an earthquake at Tsvetkovo, in the district of Tadzhikistan, near the Afghan/Soviet border.

The quake struck on Oct. 8. All telephone and telegraph communication with the district was interrupted, accounting for the delay in the news.

The first messages said the population was without doctors or medicines and appealed for immediate help.

Bridges across the Khandan River were destroyed and the property damage was reported heavy.

Doctors, with medical and food supplies, were being rushed in from surrounding districts. Other physicians and supplies will leave Moscow as soon as the weather permits.

POLITICAL CAMPAIGN DRAWSTOCLOSE

894 Candidates Wind Up Appeals To Electorate Today.

With last-minute appeals from political leaders ringing in their ears, Canadians will march to the polls Monday to elect the next government of the country. This is the last day of the campaign which has been progressing with more or less intensity for two months.

Candidates totaling 894, a record for Canada, will fight it out for the 245 seats in the House. C. P. liberals have 242, Conservatives, 232, Reconstructionists, 174, C. C. F., 118, Social Credit, 47 and all others 81.

Three of the four national parties have enough men in the field to form a majority in the House and the fourth, the C. P., could form a government with assistance from other groups.

There are smaller groups like the Social Creditors in the West who are not large enough to take over the treasury benches but might have a political influence in the next House.

The list of candidates runs right down the scale to a single Technician, Communist, an Anti-Communist, Laborites and a man running in Verdun, Que., as a Verdun candidate.

This will be the first election where a basic voters' list is used. And if a man's name wasn't on the list when it was revised some months ago, there is no way of getting it on unless the printers had omitted it. The list behind a basic list was to bring on an election with a minimum of delay and prevent illegal practices like telegraphing and impersonation.

As a result of a Redistribution Bill passed by the last House, constituency boundaries will not be the same as in 1930 although there will be the same number of seats. Every 10 years a census is taken in Canada and this determines the number of seats in each province, Quebec being the stationary factor with 65. The net result of the last census was that Nova Scotia lost two seats; New Brunswick one; Alberta gained one and British Columbia gained two.

During the last six weeks or two months each of the four national leaders toured the country from coast to coast. For the last few days Premier Bennett, Liberal leader King and Reconstructionist leader Stevens have been in Ontario, considered the key province in the election. J. S. Woodsworth, leader of the C. C. F., has been in Winnipeg most of this week.

WHAT A FAMILY!

MELBOURNE, Oct. 11.—Five sisters, who are total 352 years, have met for the first time in 10 years in Melbourne.

Between them they have no less than 500 descendants. The oldest, Mrs. Burke, aged 80, has 12 children, 62 grandchildren and 47 great grandchildren.

ETHIOPIANS RECAPTURE ADUWA, REPORT

2,500 Italian Defenders Alleged to Have Been Killed in Counter Attack.

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 11.—Unverified reports that Ethiopian warriors had swept down on Aduwa under cover of darkness, recapturing that epochal battle site and seizing Italian cannons, arms, and ammunition, reached this capital today.

(A Reuters report, cited as unconfirmed, said the Ethiopians had massacred Aduwa's 2,500 defenders.)

The Ethiopians suffered heavy losses, the rumors said, but managed to take back the village, scene of an Italian military rout 39 years ago and captured by Mussolini's men only last Sunday.

Government officials, their communication lines to the north broken, said they had heard no such news.

Killed Defenders
The Reuters report stated more than 50,000 men of Ras Seyoum, Ethiopian commander in the north, last night surrounded Aduwa and "killed every one" of its defenders.

(This was flatly denied by officials in Rome.)
At the same time an exchange of telegrams between Italian headquarters in Addis Ababa and General Emilio De Bono, Commander of all colonial troops, had motored into Aduwa with his staff today.

The Reuters report said bitter hand-to-hand fighting raged at Aduwa throughout the night, the attackers using swords and spears to combat the bayonets of the Italians.

(The Italians, after the battle, were described as rallying their forces north of the town for a fierce rearguard thrust.)

Other Reuters dispatches from Asmara, Eritrea, said two Ethiopian chiefs were being held by Ras Seyoum to form an Italian drive toward Gondar.)

Envoy Ordered To Leave
The maze of rumors coincided with capitulation by Luigi Vinciguicci, the Italian Minister here, to a demand of Emperor Haile Selassie that he leave of his own volition by 11 a. m. tomorrow or be forcibly put out.

Vinci and his aides, yielding to the persuasion of other members of the diplomatic corps, said they would leave tomorrow.

The Emperor, who today informed the League of Nations that Ethiopia will never bow to Italy's armed forces, refused Vinci an audience. He did, however, assure him of the fullest protection for himself and the Magale Constair staff, and the Ministers will be given a special train and accorded other dignities due one of his

ELECTORS RALLY TO CONSERVATIVE CAUSE IN EVERY PROVINCE

Ottawa Reports Indicate Return Of Bennett Government With Majority Over All Parties.

OTTAWA, Oct. 12.—Magnificent receptions have been accorded the Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister of Canada, at every point in Quebec and Ontario, causing a wave of unprecedented enthusiasm for the Conservative cause in Central Canada.

This, together with the consolidation of tremendous gains made in Western Canada through the Prime Minister's visit, backed by confidential reports from all over Canada, indicate beyond doubt the return of the Bennett Government with a majority over all parties.

Britain Lays Plans For Elaborate Defence Scheme

LONDON, Oct. 11.—Havas said it had learned from usually reliable sources tonight of elaborate plans drawn up by the defence ministries in the event of an Anglo-Italian war in the Mediterranean.

Experts of the War Office, the Air Ministry and the Admiralty were considering, as is customary, purely hypothetical conditions and the steps which might be taken under such circumstances.

The plans, Havas reported, included a defence of the Suez Canal by some 400 airplanes, secret arrangements to ring the Malta naval base with mines on a few hours' notice, the air defence of Egypt and concentration of naval units in the Mediterranean and Red Seas.

It was understood arrangements were under way with Spain for establishment of a British air and naval base at Mahon, at the extreme south end of Minorca, Balearic Islands and that the Spanish had been asked to forbid use of inlets on her coast to Italian submarines, in the event of war.

The plans even contemplated the invasion of Sicily and establishment of a British air base there, commanding the Italian mainland.

The defence of Egypt was brought to the fore by the concentration of 80,000 Italian troops on the Libyan frontier under General Italo Balbo. Air-Marshal Sir Robert Brooke-Popham is at present making a study of defence steps in the Mediterranean.

Confessed Slayer Hangs Self

PONTIAC, Michigan, Oct. 11.—Ferrin Rowland, confessed slayer of his two small step-daughters, invoked the death penalty that Michigan law does not provide by hanging himself today in his jail cell.

The taciturn, 36-year-old carpenter, woodsman and farmer who had said that memories of the drowning of the unsuspecting children "bothered me some," was dead when an officer reached his cell to take him into municipal court for arraignment.

He faced a murder charge, based upon his signed confession that he wired weights around the necks of his two daughters by a previous marriage, Katherine Woodin, six, and Virginia, 2-1-2, and drowned them the night of Sept. 17 in desolate Bloot Lake, in Northern Oakland County.

SUCCUMBS TO INJURIES
NE WESTMINSTER, B. C., Oct. 11.—(C.P.)—Harry Bourke, 26, reported to have come here a week ago from Sydney, N. S., died in hospital today from injuries received in an automobile accident near Pitt Meadows. B. C. Bourke lost control of the car, which overturned in the ditch.

ETHIOPIAN CHIEFTAIN DESERTS

Joins Italian Troops With 12,000 Warriors, Is Report.

ASMARA, Eritrea, Oct. 11.—Ras Haile Selassie Gugga, Governor of East Tigre province, has deserted Ethiopia and has gone over to Italy with 12,000 trained troops—all fully equipped with rifles and ammunition—and 100 machine guns, Italian army headquarters here announced tonight.

East Tigre province is strategically situated on the Eritrean border. Its seat is Miskale, key mountain city at the edge of the vast Danakil plateau. The province takes in the disputed region at the junction of the Ethiopian, Eritrean and French Somaliland borders where Italy started war on Ethiopia last week.

The Italian announcement followed repeated Ethiopian claims that natives on the north and southeast fronts had deserted Italian armies to join Ethiopian forces.

Many of Ras Haile Selassie Gugga's men were believed to be Italian-trained troops originally from Gollan Province, in West Ethiopia on the Anglo-Egyptian border. These are the soldiers known as Tromboli, a corruption of the word "Trippoli." The name was given them after they had helped Italy conquer Tripoli.

Since the war began Italian planes have showered a heavy barrage of propaganda leaflets over the territory occupied by these men. Italian officers have predicted confidently that the Tromboli would desert Ethiopia.

He is heir-presumptive to the Spanish throne. The 22-year-old Prince had hoped to have the officers act as ushers.

Special trains today brought 1,500 exiled Spanish monarchists from all parts of Europe to the wedding, which will be celebrated by the Cardinal Archbishop of Plasencia, Yofanful Brunete Marica Mercedes of the Spanish branch of the Bourbon-Orleans family is one of the prettiest and most "eligible" of Europe's Princesses.

Heid For Scrap Heap
SOUTHAMPTON, Oct. 11.—The liner Olympic, which opened the Southampton-New York big-ship service in 1912, left its home port for the last time at five p. m. today, bound for Jarrow, where it will be broken up.

Departure of the famous liner dispelled rumors it might be kept here indefinitely for possible use as a troop transport in case of necessity.

Better Price Prospects For P. E. I. Tubers

Brokers Report Increased Movement Of Tubers In Past Few Weeks.

Farmers of Prince Edward Island looked forward to brighter prospects of marketing their table stock potatoes yesterday while the market for seed potatoes was uncertain.

Brokers reported greater movement of potatoes in the last few weeks than for a period of several months last year. Irish Cobblers were being loaded daily at Charlottetown at 35 cents a bushel compared with eight and 10 cents last year.

The yield was estimated at 5,400,000 bushels from the 32,000 acres under cultivation. The yield in 1934 was about 8,000,000 bushels from its produce.

Large Gold Shipments To United States

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Further substantial engagements of gold for shipment to the United States were reported in Wall Street banking circles today.

One of the largest of the transactions involves an early transfer of \$2,485,000 in gold from England. Local banks also engaged \$8,335,000 from France; \$1,515,000 from India; \$508,000 from Ecuador; \$209,000 from Chile and \$145,000 from Holland. The above engagements will raise the total inward movement of the yellow metal since last September to upwards of \$371,000,000.

Arrivals today included \$4,705,406 from France; \$1,700,200 from Canada and \$985,300 from England.
