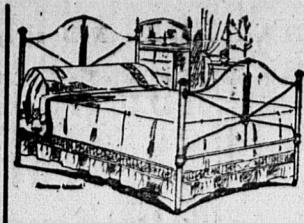

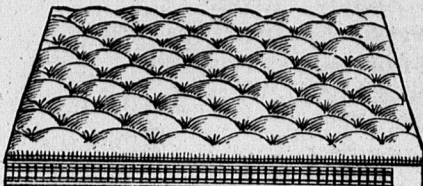

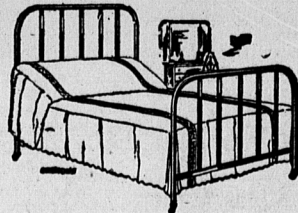

The past year was a record one both in points of attendance and finances, the total enrollment being 114 and the collections from all sources \$211.40. Of this amount, \$37.00 was subscribed to missions; \$50.00 to Manse fund, all periodicals paid for, for the coming six months and a sum on hand of over \$20.00. Fifty one visitors were in the school during the year, five of the Intermediate boys attended camp at Margate, three of the Senior girls attended the Young People's Conference in Charlottetown, and four members of the school, united with the church, and five received special recognition for perfect attendance. On motion, there was placed on record a resolution of sympathy for Miss Reta Pickering of the Senior girls' class, on the removal by death of Mrs. H. T. Pickering and her school, as she was for many years the Supt. of the Home Department, and a highly esteemed member. Rev. R. H. Baxter preached, during the winter, with much acceptance in a number of the island congregations, and Murray Harbour North is to be congratulated on this appointment. Some time was spent in discussing the various congregations of the expenses of the Church Property Commission. A number of the allotments were agreed upon there being a hearty response from many. A small committee consisting of the following, as her father, Rev. J. B. Gough was, at one time, pastor of the former Methodist Pleasant Valley Circuit.

The Mississippi is the main stem of the greatest drainage system of the continent and one of the world's greatest. Properly speaking, it extends within a hundred miles of the border but innumerable tributary streams cross the line. The total annual discharge is 23 trillion cubic feet. This is 6775,000 per second. NO FURTHER DOUBT ABOUT EGG-GRADING.
TORONTO, May 17.—Any doubt which may have existed with respect to the legal position of the Dominion Government in administering the Live Stock and Live Stock Products Act, and the egg regulations passed thereunder, has been removed through the adoption of enabling legislation by the Province. This action on the part of the Provincial Legislature overcomes the difficulty which arose last year following the decision handed down by the Supreme Court of Ontario, in which it was ruled that the clauses of the egg regulations affecting domestic trading were ultra vires of the Dominion Parliament.
