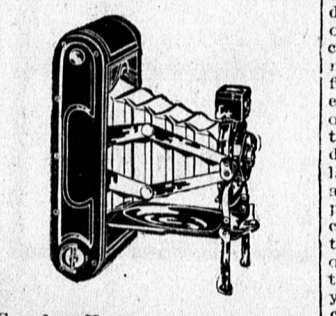

SAFETY IN TRAVELLING.—Mr. J. E. Long, "Safety First" Engineer on the Canadian Government Railways, is in Charlottetown, in the interests of the "Safety First" organization. The "safety first" system of preventing accidents on the railroad was put into force on January 1st, and since that time there has been a decrease of 50 per cent. in the number of employees killed and 15.5 in the number injured as compared with the corresponding period of 1913.

ILLINOIS RAILROADS. CHICAGO, July 22.—According to statistics compiled in the office of the State Auditor, the railroads of Illinois in 1913 paid \$1,774,718 more taxes than in 1912. Steam roads in Illinois paid this year on the 1913 assessed valuation \$7,824,470 taxes and electric roads \$920,170. This is exclusive of \$1,355,173 which the Illinois Central Railroad paid as 7 per cent of the gross earnings on 705.5 miles of its main trackage under the General Revenue Act. The total equalized value of the steam roads and the state in 1913 was \$192,779,362 against \$184,044,369 in 1912. Electric roads \$18,134,047, against \$17,609,830 in 1912. Total \$210,913,409 against \$201,654,205 in 1912. Figures are exclusive of the Illinois Central main trackage valuation. The aggregate equalized value taxation was \$8,744,591 against \$7,105,792 in 1912.
