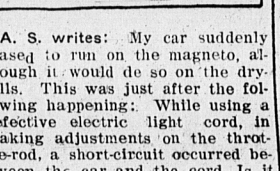

HINTS FOR The Motorist

LIGHTING CURRENT DISABLES MAGNETO



A. S. writes: My car suddenly ceased to run on the magneto, although it would do so on the dry-cells. This was just after the following happening: While using a defective electric light cord, in making adjustments on the three-toed, short-circuit occurred between the car and the cord. Is it possible that this accident accounts for the trouble and how? If so, what is the remedy? Can the excessively damp weather followed by a cold snap, account for the trouble?

Answer: If a flow of electric light current actually occurred from some point in the primary winding to ground through the magneto and engine, we should expect it to have demagnetized the magnets and although this seems very unusual happening it may be exactly what took place. Your remedy is to take your car to an electric service station and have the magneto recharged by the use of direct current, which can be done without any disassembling. If this does not set matters right it may be that the magneto winding is open circuited or grounded, in which case you will have to have it taken out. We hardly think that the weather could have had any influence as the magneto runs in oil and is fully enclosed.

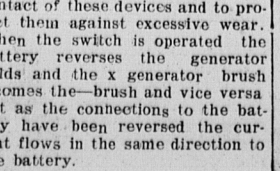
POPULARITY REVERSING SWITCH



G. B. asks: What is the function of the popularity changing switch, using with the starting and lighting system? They advise that this should be operated about once every month or so.

Answer: Where two contact-points are used to make and break an electric circuit and the current flows constantly in one direction, one of these contacts wears away to equalize the rate of contact change the current direction so that the contact that has been wearing may cease to do so and even build up slightly. In the system you refer to there is a vibratory-contact voltage regulator of the variable field resistance type and also the usual form of cut-out or relay and the object of the polarity changing switch is to reverse the direction of current through the contact of these devices and to protect them against excessive wear. When the switch is operated the battery reverses the generator fields and the x generator brush becomes the - brush and vice versa but as the connections to the battery have been reversed the current flows in the same direction to the battery.

EXHAUST GASES ENTER CLOSED CAR



M. T. C. writes: I am seriously troubled by the exhaust gas, which enters the body of the small coupe which I drive. The connections between the exhaust pipe and the manifold and muffler have both been packed but this has not overcome the trouble. Can you suggest anything?

Answer: It is certain that all exhaust connections are tight and the muffler itself does not leak, the only suggestion we can make is this: That you adopt some means of closing the slots in the footboard through which the pedals and levers pass, for the purpose of preventing entrance into the car of exhaust gas that may be swept under it by the wind or otherwise. Attachments for this purpose are furnished for some makes of cars, consisting of rubber pads that slide with the pedals and seal the slots. If you have a heater in the car, floor or any means for warming the intake by exhaust heat, it will be well to see that these devices are not causing the trouble. Are the connections between the exhaust manifold and the cylinders perfectly tight?

TRAINMEN TRUSTED TO LUCK AND EIGHT PERSONS LOST LIVES.

TORONTO, ONT., Feb. 18.—Eight people were killed because trainmen "trusted to luck," or failed to obey instructions, is the finding of Julian D. Loudon, special commissioner appointed by the Attorney-General to probe the cause of the recent wreck of the Canadian Pacific Railway near North Bay. Hon. W. E. Raney received the commissioner's findings this morning and immediately made them public.

"People who travel on trains want to know if it is safe to sit in the observation car," said the Attorney-General, who ordered a special investigation because the finding of the coroner's jury was unsatisfactory.

It was the duty of Thomas Joseph Curley, rear trainman of section one, to protect the passengers by running back thirty-six telegraph poles and placing torpedoes on the rails to warn the oncoming train that the line was blocked. This Curley failed to do, according to the Commissioner's finding. Mr. Loudon also finds that John Silas Alexander, conductor of the first section, failed to do what he might have done. "He took no steps whatever to protect his train, and trusted entirely to the trainmen and to luck," reads the finding. "If no trainmen had gone backwards to protect the rear, I would consider that this conductor would have been much to blame, but as Curley did go back, I find Alexander's carelessness didn't cause the wreck," he adds.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE NECESSARY QUALIFICATION

SASKATOON, Feb. 23.—At this morning's session of the Saskatchewan Grain Growers convention, resolutions decrying governmental influence in elections, both federal and provincial, demanding the abolition of political patronage and a demand for open political conventions were all carried with barely any discussion.

General discussion arose just before recess at one o'clock on the matter of naturalization. The question came up by way of the amendments proposed to the national platform already accepted by the Grain Growers of Ontario and Alberta. A lengthy and heated discussion followed, the English delegates took the floor. As a whole the convention went on record as favoring such qualifications and the vote was taken amid great excitement.

Announcement was made this morning that T. A. Crear, ex-Minister of Agriculture in the federal government, will not be able to attend the convention owing to illness.

DALHOUSIE GOES OUT FOR MILLION IN JUNE

HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 19.—"Dalhousie will launch her campaign for a million dollars in June," said President A. Stanley MacKenzie today.

"Our plans were made last spring and the campaign was set for the fall, but when it was found that the Church Forward Movement then taking steps was also fixed for that time it was felt that Dalhousie must not do anything which would interfere with the success of the movement, and our campaign was fixed tentatively for the new year. Then the organizers of the church movement decided on a delay until February for their drive and Dalhousie had again to postpone her campaign. It is now definitely fixed for June."

Mr. G. Fred Pearson has been appointed manager of the campaign and under his direction the preliminary campaign organization work has been completed. Literature prepared and central committees organized in many places, continued Dr. MacKenzie.

"It is most gratifying to know," said Dr. MacKenzie, "that Dalhousie is everywhere maintaining a keen interest in the campaign and are assuring their Alma-Mater of their interest and support. So keen is the interest taken, I have no doubt the objective of a million dollars which after all is only about twice as much as was realized in the 1912 campaign, will be reached."

"The business men of Nova Scotia, realizing that the progress and development of the country depend in large part upon the excellence of the facilities provided for higher education, are prepared in way never before shown to back up this movement of Dalhousie to put herself in a position to meet the needs of the times."
