ALBERTON FOX SHOW OPENED YESTERDAY

Native Of Island Passes In New Jersey

Word was received on Friday of the death in Avon by the Sea, New Jersey of Captain Russell S. Ramsay who passed away on November 12 at 62 years of age.

Captain Ramsay was a native of Malpeque, P. E. I., but left his native province in his early boyhood to follow the calling of the sea. Starting in coastal schooners and working his way up in his profession until he became a captain of a large sailing ship plying between England and Australia. About 25 years ago he was transferred to a steamship line sailing from New York to South American ports, and as far round as Panama. He was made a senior captain in this company's service, serving with them until after the Great War. He retired from active service some three years ago and resided quietly in the town in New Jersey where he died.

He leaves to mourn his widow, living in New Jersey and many relatives on P. E. I. Among these are his mother, Mrs. Wm. George Ramsay of Malpeque; two brothers Ralph and Herbert, also in Malpeque; one brother, Charles W. Ramsay, Summerside; and three sisters in Boston, Mass., also four sisters, Mrs. W. J. Harrington, Spring Side; Mrs. Thomas Bishop, S'Isle; Mrs. Waldron and Mrs. Dr. Parke, in Boston, Mass. Much sympathy is extended to the bereaved relatives. Interment was at New Jersey.—S.

and Secretary Hull at his right. Behind them stood the members of the United States cabinet and the Canadian Trade Commission. A solid line of news photographers faced the desk and behind them flashed the Washington correspondents, as many as could get into the room.

Flashlight bulbs sputtered as the statesmen affixed their signatures and they were made to go through the motion a second time for the benefit of the cameramen. Then they pocketed the special fountain pens provided for the occasion, to be kept as souvenirs.

President Roosevelt shook hands warmly with Mr. King when the signing had been completed. It had been a historic occasion, he said, and he expressed his happiness that the Canadian Prime Minister had come to Wellington.

At a press conference held immediately after the signing Mr. Roosevelt told the correspondents that he would meet them with his experts in the oval room on the second floor of the White House, Sunday afternoon at two o'clock, to explain all the details of the treaty.

Present at the signing, in addition to those named, were Norman Armour, United States minister to Ottawa last night with Mr. King, and the following Canadians: Hector MacKinnon, Canadian Tariff Commissioner; L. D. Wilgress, chief of the foreign trade division of the Department of Trade and Commerce; Norman Robertson, member of the secretariat of the Department of Trade and Commerce, all of whom have been here for two weeks concluding the treaty. E. B. Pickering, private secretary to the Prime Minister and Merchant Mahoney, commercial attaché at the Canadian legation.

their leader, Sir Herbert Samuel, also the veteran Isaac Fox, and their two chief whips, Sir Walter Rea and Harcourt Johnston. Sir Francis Acland, another prominent Liberal, escaped defeat by only 836. The opposition Liberals, who were only 30 at the dissolution, are now reduced to a handful.

Strong Opposition

Yet with its great victory the Government faces livelier opposition. The battle at the polls had the result of restoring to the Labour front bench five former Labour Cabinet members who have been out of Parliament for four years—Herbert Morrison, J. R. Clynes, A. V. Alexander, H. B. Lees-Smith and Thomas Johnston.

Some minor members of the last Labour Government were also successful. Among them were Hugh Dalton, E. O. Roberts, Thomas M. Kennedy, Emanuel Shinwell (who defeated Ramsay MacDonald) C. G. Ammon, Fred Montague, F. O. Petwick and Lawrence.

Wedgwood Benn, W. Adamson, Miss Margaret Bondfield, who were also in the last Labour Government, have failed to make a comeback.

Georges Returned

David Lloyd George, his son Gwilym and his daughter Miss Megan Lloyd George were again successful. Winston Churchill was re-elected with an increased majority, but his son Randolph was defeated in West Teotth, Liverpool.

James Maxton, leader of the Independent Labor Party, will be back again with three followers. Their stronghold is in Glasgow.

"It is a splendid result," declared Prime Minister Baldwin before leaving London tonight for a week-end at Chequers. "The country has renewed its support for the National Government."

submit at a later hearing probably to be held at Ottawa, affidavits from Ontario residents.

Mr. Burchell opposed adjournment on grounds that the railways had had sufficient time to bring their witnesses to Moncton and that the court should have been prepared to close the case here.

Assistant Chief Commissioner S. J. MacLean instructed the railway counsel to hasten the taking of the affidavits and forwarding of copies to Mr. Burchell, so he might advise whether or not he would appear at the further hearing and cross-examine the witnesses then.

Mr. MacLean and the other commissioners, J. A. Stoneman and G. A. Stone, left tonight for Amherst, where they will hear a case tomorrow.

Astounded At Remarks

"When Mr. Sedgwick addressed the Board yesterday," Mr. Burchell remarked in the course of today's hearing, "as a Maritimer I was so shocked and astounded at the attitude which he took allegedly on behalf of the Province of Ontario that I could not trust myself to speak. When he claims that the Province of Ontario will object to reductions made by the parliament of Canada in respect of rates over our own Maritime railways in order to enable our merchants, traders and manufacturers to market in other parts of Canada, I cannot believe he is speaking for the heart of the Province of Ontario. This was the very purpose for which the Intercolonial Railway was built, and was the sole inducing reason urged by Ontario and Quebec to bring the Maritimes into Confederation.

Challenge Parliament Right

"Mr. Sedgwick now comes down from Ontario, not to dispute these facts, but to tell us in cold blood that in spite of the admitted facts, the Parliament of Canada has not the right to rectify a wrong to the Maritimes by reducing the rates over the Intercolonial Railway to enable us to market our goods in the central provinces. Up to the year 1917 the tariffs of rates on the Intercolonial Railway were fixed under the direct authority of the Parliament of Canada.

"It was not until 1917 that the Board of Railways Commissioners were given control over the rates and they were then raised to equal those in other parts of Canada. The Parliament of Canada controlled rates over the Intercolonial Railway from 1867 to 1917 and during that period as is found in the Duncan report the rates were always about 20 per cent lower than those in the rest of Canada. That was in accordance with the agreement made at the time of Confederation.

Cites Section

"Section 121 of the B. N. A. Act upon which Mr. Sedgwick relies is as follows: 'All articles of the growth, produce or manufacture of any of the provinces shall from and after the union be admitted free into each of the other provinces.'

"I fail to see how under any possible construction of this section that it touches upon the power of the Parliament of Canada to implement the promises made at Confederation to build the Intercolonial Railway, and to carry out traffic over that railway at rates lower than those in force in other parts of Canada. The section is rather in our favor in that it recognized the right of one province to sell to another, or which right I may add the Province of Ontario has taken full advantage in selling its tariff protected manufactured articles in the Maritime Provinces in large quantities.

ALL ROADS POINT TO BORDEN

"Mr. Sedgwick will have some fight on his hands if he proposes to attack legislation which gives special railway rates to any section of Canada as apparently he intends to do. The report of the Duncan Commission was approved and in great part implemented by the Parliament of Canada. That report found that the increases in rates made, particularly since 1912, placed a burden upon the trade and commerce of the Maritime Provinces which it was clear from the pronouncements and obligations undertaken at Confederation it was never intended the Maritimes should bear, and a burden which the Commission, and later the Parliament of Canada, found was in fact responsible in very considerable measure for depressing abnormally in the Maritimes the business and enterprise which had been originated and developed on the basis of the rate structure as it then stood. That burden was in part removed by the Maritime Freight Rates Act and the Maritimes will not and cannot permit that burden again to be imposed."
