ENGLISH RUNNER SMASHES MILE RECORD

Nationals Win Way Into Finals

"Tie" Williams batted and pitched the Nationals into the finals of the Industrial League baseball playoffs yesterday as his team defeated the Bees 7-6 and 4-1 in the doubleheader semi-final held at the Victoria Park diamond.

Williams' home run in the eighth inning of the first game with a man on base started the rally that led to a three-run lead that the Bees couldn't overcome while in the second encounter Williams went to the mound to let the Bees down with four hits, pitched eight scoreless innings and was only robbed of a run when the "team" Mel Diamond, who had a perfect day at the plate in the first game, walked off a home run in the seventh inning.

Whether or not the Nats victory will mean a return to the scene as Bees immediately upon completion of the game tied a protest with umpire Ed Ryan claiming that the Nationals had scored but four runs during the eight-inning rally.

The final game was a closely knit affair with errors playing a major part in the scoring. Playing two runners across in the top of the second Nationals saw their opponents' error counters in the second but they had to bees second inning tally, gave them a 4-2 lead. From this point right up to the ninth inning Lester hurled scoreless ball as his steamers, and as the Bees' batters watch third strikes beat by regularly. But the break came in the last of the eighth.

Saunders, safe at first on an error, paraded across the plate as Williams batted a home run to deep center field to tie up the score and before they had been retired Nats came through with three more hits, two of them for extra bases, and as the Bees' batters batted defensively with three additional miscues checked up against them, the winners put three more runners across the plate.

Lester, a heroic figure in defeat, started in the ninth with two out to put his mates within one run of their opponents but McFarlane staided at this point to force the last batter to hit into a double play, ending the rally and game.

Williams stole the show in the second encounter with a great pitching performance. A bewildering change of pace saw the Bees with the exception of Diamond and Rice fare badly at the plate and it was Diamond who rarer the shut out homer in the seventh when the ball became lost in the long grass in the outfield, a hit that ordinarily would have been held to a double.

Halifax Capitals Eliminate Liverpool In Weird Game.

S., Aug. 29—Halifax Capitals erased Liverpool Pirates from the Nova Scotia baseball playdowns here Saturday in the seventh and final game of the series between the teams, winning 14-11 in the most exciting and amazing exhibition delivered in provincial baseball history.

The result places Halifax against the winner of the Hantsport-Kingsport series in the Nova Scotia semi-finals.

Pirates came a dime a dozen. Melish Lane, Capita's starting twirler, lasted through one rocky inning. Thorburne who opened for Liverpool, staggered through three. O'Neill pitched to two Liverpool batters and four runs resulted. The others, with the exception of Vic Lewis, Halifax southpaw, were little better.

Liverpool took a four-run lead in the first inning on two hits and four Halifax errors but the Capitals came back with two in the second and four more in the third as the Liverpool infield left apart.

For all of a complete inning, both teams played baseball but the Pirates staged a desperate offensive in the seventh, lashing out eight hits, including Al Young's homer with the bases loaded. Left fielder Vince Ferguson was camped under the ball waiting for it when it hit a tree branch and bounced into fair centre.

Capitals came back with a brace in their half and doubled it in the eighth. Liverpool errors contributed materially.

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Stanley Wooderson Runs Distance In 4.06.6 To Beat Cunningham's Listed Mark

(By Scooty Reston, Associated Press Sports Writer) LONDON, Aug. 29—Stanley Wooderson, little, spindly, bespectacled bank clerk, smashed the world mile record Saturday and became the first Englishman in more than 50 years to set a new international standard at that paced distance.

Wooderson, who gained fame as the man the fleet New Zealander, Jack Lovelock, couldn't beat, accepted an invitation to try for a new world standard over his favorite track in Holsport Park, London, during a meet held by his own club, the Blackheath Harriers.

Wooderson was caught in 58.6 in the quarter-mile post, 2:02.6 at the half and 3:07.2 at the three-quarters. Thus he achieves his new record mainly through fast times in the first and fourth quarters. By quarters his times were 59.6, 64.0, 64.5 and 59.4.

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Title Bout All Set For Tonight

(By Eddie Brietta) (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Aug. 29—With the weather man promising to lend a hand, Joe Louis and Tommy Farr, will attempt to go through with their postponed world's heavyweight title match at the Yankee Stadium tomorrow night.

The 23 year old champion and youthful Welshman who holds the British Empire title, originally were scheduled to settle their argument last Thursday night, but Promoter Mike Jacobs ordered a four-day postponement because of rainy weather and also because he hoped the delay might boost a none-too-promising ticket sale.

Both purposes appear to have been accomplished. The forecast is for cloudy weather but no rain tomorrow night while the fair weather of the past two days has helped business at the box office.

Promoter Jacobs, who has insisted all along the fight would not gross less than \$300,000, is jubilant. He paid flying visits to both training camps today and hoisted his guests to a gala of between \$350,000 and \$400,000 and a crowd of not less than 40,000.

The delay has brought no change in expert opinion. The men who make their living following and writing about fights are almost unanimous in the belief Louis will dispose of the challenger by the knockout route in well under 12 rounds. Most of them say the thunder will strike between the first and seventh rounds.

Both fighters must weigh in and be examined again tomorrow. The only untoward event since the postponement was the fact Farr was belted to the canvas by Abe Feldman, one of his sparring partners, during a workout Friday. The Farr camp insists it was more of a slip than a knockdown, but newspapermen at the ringside say Feldman caught the Welshman with a swift right to send him to the floor.

The incident so enraged Tommy that when he got Feldman in the ring with him Saturday, he treated him so roughly with both fists that Abe was groggy long before the second round was completed.

2 Canadian Records Fall At Winnipeg

(By Ross Munro) WINNIPEG, Aug. 29—Two Canadian records were established and three Manitoba marks bettered Saturday as track and field athletes from Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Alberta competed in the British Columbia and Manitoba Canadian Games zone trials. Winnipeg stars, displaying championship form, dominated the meet.

Robina Higgins of Winnipeg shattered her own Canadian open record in the women's javelin throw by more than five feet. Competing against two Regina girls, Francis Orway and Alice Robinson, Robina tossed the javelin 128 feet 3 1/2 inches. Her previous record of 123 feet 2 1/2 inches was set here last year.

A new Canadian open mark was established also in the discus throw when Eric Coy of Winnipeg set the disc 145 feet 9 3/4 inches. Greg Sabat of Winnipeg was the former record holder with a toss of 145 feet five inches. Coy also won the shot-put with a heave of 45 feet 6 1/2 inches.

Records of the zone meet will be set in Canada's British Empire Games. Committee for comparison with results of other zone trials. From records of all zones, the committee will select the Canadian team to compete in Australia next year.
