As a teacher your kindness and patience in dealing with the children and overlooking their faults and shortcomings (of which no doubt there were many) has naturally endeared you to them as it has to us, and their sorrow in losing you is, if possible, even greater than our own—which believe us no words of ours could fully express, and we need scarcely say that wherever you may go, you will take with you our warmest wishes for your happiness and welfare. May you always be as happy as you have endeavored to make your pupils, and may they always be as faithful to their duties to others as you have been in your duties to them.
