The driver was stunned, but none of the occupants suffered injury. It is said that there was another party racing with them and that they, after turning about, arrived back just as the driver came to with a piece of the steering wheel in his hand. The car was a complete wreck, the railings of the bridge having pierced her radiator in several places and twisting parts of the engine out of shape.

ROOKWOOD POTTERY
Rookwood pottery is made on a country estate, named Rookwood, near the city of Cincinnati, Ohio. Each piece is the original design of its artist workers, who are men and women mainly drawn from the Academy of Art of Cincinnati. No two pieces are ever made alike, and each is inscribed not only with the artist's emblem, a torch and flame, but the monogram of the artist. This gives each worker an individual pride in his output, which must be a real work of art. The pieces are made of Ohio clay. For years yellows, browns and reds were the prevailing shades, but later chemical discoveries enabled the pottery to "turn out" deep, rich greens and blues. The decorations are placed upon the moist clay before firing, the colors being mixed with the clay and becoming part of the ware itself. Various glazes are applied afterward, which increase the risk of completion. The chief beauty of the Rookwood is its depth of glaze which gives to it a rich, deep mysterious appearance. Many pieces are not decorated with any design, but depend for their rare beauty upon shape, artistry of line, and depth and richness of color. silver and wash it with clear water.

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 27.—Extreme dullness marked the export trade in Canadian grain here today. The only trade of importance in the spot cash market was a sale of a round lot of no. 3 northern wheat at 63-4c per bushel over the Winnipeg October option, and a small lot of no. 2 northern at 123-4c.

The demand was quiet with Manitoba over C I F Montreal. The local market for carlots of wheat and cats was strong and prices for the former were advanced three to four cents per bushel and for the latter one to two cents per bushel.

IMMIGRATION RESTRICTIONS
WINNIPEG, Aug. 27.—Ill feeling in British official circles over Canadian immigration restrictions has been somewhat mitigated by Canada's readiness to co-operate in the miner-harvester scheme, stated Lord Lovat, Under-Secty. of State for the Dominions who is touring Canada. "The thing which we in Great Britain do not understand," he said, "is the fact that Canada can bring 51,000 immigrants from non-preferred countries annually and only 50,000 from the British Empire. We are told there are only jobs for that many, that Canada cannot absorb more Britishers. Surely we are not entirely wrong in believing that Britishers could fill some of those 51,000 jobs you have given to foreigners."

MINERAL OIL DRESSING.
Mayonnaise may be made with mineral oil instead of olive oil. This is a pleasant way to take the mineral oil and avoid the fattening element of the olive oil. It is double way to help reduce. Mix a half teaspoon of mustard, a teaspoon of salt, a half teaspoon of sugar, a dash of cayenne; add one egg yoke and mix again. Add a half teaspoon of vinegar or lemon juice and the oil drop by drop at first and beat with an egg beater. When the mixture begins to thicken the oil can be added more quickly. As the mixture grows thicker add more vinegar or lemon juice to thin it to the right consistency for a good stiff dressing. One cup of mineral may be used in this dressing. Keep the dressing covered, in the ice-box. If it separates, take a fresh egg yoke and add the dressing to it, little by little, until it is all beaten stiff.

Bees Hold Up Funeral

(British United Press) LONDON, August, 27.—A swarm of bees created an extraordinary scene the other day when a large crowd assembled for a funeral in Ballynaaseagh graveyard, just outside Waterford.

The people has gathered around the grave, when suddenly they were attacked by the bees, and indescribable confusion followed.

The cries of women and children mingled with the shouts of men as they fell over one another in their efforts to escape. Several people were badly stung about the eyes, and women's arms and backs suffered severely.

"There seemed to be millions of bees," said one of the victims, "and they simply drove the people mad. We had to dash away as fast as we could and the coffin remained only half buried. The grave diggers promised to return to-morrow morning to complete the burial."

CROSSING ACCIDENT KILLS FIVE TOURISTS AND INJURES SIXTH. MONTREAL, Aug. 28.—Five tourists from Cleveland were killed and a sixth probably fatally injured when their automobile was struck and demolished by a Canadian Pacific boat special at Yamachiche, Que., today. The dead were reported indentified as follows: Mr. and Mrs. George Wise; Mrs. Lester Vanderwerf and her two small children, Jack and Jean. Mrs. Mary Doty was taken to the Norman Cross Hospital, Three Rivers, where it is stated she was very critically injured. The train was eastbound for Quebec and according to railway officials, was travelling at 45 miles an hour when it struck the automobile at the third crossing out of Yamachiche on the road to Quebec City.
