

LORD ROBERTS ASKS FOR MORE SOLDIERS

LONDON, April 4.—In the House of Lords last evening, Lord Roberts moved a resolution reading: "That in view of the strategic conditions of Europe, this House views with grave and growing concern the inadequate military arrangement of the Government for the defence of the country and His Majesty's overseas dominions."

Lord Roberts said it required special courage to introduce such a motion at a time when there was so much talk of disarmament and peace, but a totally unexpected incident had encouraged him. He referred to the speech of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. Asquith, in the House of Commons on the 27th of March.

Lord Roberts said that the Government's existing forces did not represent either her resources or the spirit which animated the nation, because it had no army to protect the territories abroad. After referring to the costly experiences of the South African war, which occurred principally through insufficiently trained troops, Lord Roberts asserted that the army needed an additional million trained men.

Lord Roberts said: "I began by referring to the optimistic and happy recent discourses on the subject of peace. I am old enough to remember the enthusiasm excited by a somewhat similar occasion sixty years ago. Then as now we were besieged from every pulpit and from every newspaper office by the aspirations and promises of immediate future in which it was predicted that our swords would soon be beaten into ploughshares and our spears into pruning hooks."

"This was in 1851, and I recall that there was not a single year in the next two decades that was not marked by some war in one portion of the globe or another. Let us by all means listen to the aspirations of the advocates of universal peace and

do all in our power to help them along, but in the meantime warned that if that flow of the prophetic outburst of 1851, let us in all respects be ready for war. It is my deliberate opinion that while other nations are daily and steadily gaining ground, our margin of safety on the sea is rapidly disappearing, and should war come upon us with the startling rapidity wherewith it has come to other nations in recent years, we shall be found absolutely unprotected."

Viscount Haldane, the Secretary of War, said Lord Roberts' suggested war for which Great Britain must prepare must be for the defence of either India against Russia, or of Canada against the United States, or of Egypt, or for the maintenance of the balance of power in Europe. He (Lord Haldane) feared that Lord Roberts' short service of a million would bring the nation to a verge of bankruptcy. He could not admit that Great Britain's army was in a bad position. He admitted that there were many defects in the present volunteer system, but when the Government was asked to abandon it for compulsory service, he said he felt as a man might who was asked to sell his consols and invest the money in a speculative gold mine.

"We are now," he continued, "engaged in negotiations with the United States for a possible treaty of arbitration. The German Chancellor has spoken of the willingness of his country to exchange naval information with us, a course which, if adopted, would tend to diminish war scares."

MILLIONS OF MEN WERE LOST IN WARS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 4.—Baron d'Estournelles de Constant, the French missionary in the cause of international peace, spoke here yesterday, taking as his text "The Campaign in Russia." The Baron said in part: "For a long time I have been endeavoring in vain to find out what the wars during the Revolution and the First Empire, cost France in men, exclusive of anything else. The figures vary from 2,000,000 to 5,000,000. Taking only the minimum and multiplying it by several generations, I find that France's population has been reduced by 20,000,000 in the course of a century. But for these wars we should now in all probability have a population of sixty million inhabitants instead of forty, who would, moreover, be physically stronger, inasmuch as—with out attempting to calculate the consequences of drink, which has a close connection with the matter—these wars eliminated the men best fitted to perpetuate their kind."

Speaking of the immense opportunities lost by Frenchmen in all parts of the world, and especially in America, he said: "The courage and work accomplished by General Charney during a century of war were not called into being by it, as some people imagine, but were already in existence and ready to be utilized in France and abroad, to future enterprises already begun. Though it was abandoned after the Seven Years War, the work accomplished by General Charney and La Salle, and later on by Lafayette and Rochambeau—none the less great, though in a different order of ideas, would tend to diminish war scares."

DEMAND MONEY TO GET SHELDON

PITTSBURG, April 5.—Assistant District-Attorney Warren Seymour appeared before Judge Marshall Brown in criminal court today and charged that local persons were trying to compel the government of Quebec province to pay money alleged to have been lost in stock transactions by Charles D. Sheldon, alias Ross and Robinson, who is wanted in Montreal in connection with financial operations involving about \$2,000,000. Seymour charges that after the grand jury had ignored a complaint against Sheldon, a second information was made before a local alderman. Meanwhile Chief Detective McCaskill was awaiting the disposition of the local case to get possession of the prisoner. The district attorney said he had investigated and found that the Canadians would have to pay money to get Sheldon, and he had advised against it.

Seymour asked an order commanding the alderman to bring the new record into court so that the district attorney can move for its dismissal. The matter will be taken up in court tomorrow.

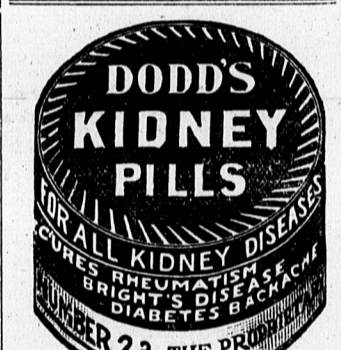
