RELIGIOUS SERVICES

THE BAPTIST CHURCH

The Rev. H. L. Denton, B.Th., B.D. took as the subject of his morning sermon "The Individual Approach to God," the text being the words of a St. Paul. "Therefore, being justified by faith we have peace with God through Jesus Christ. It is interesting to consider the words of the scriptures as set forth in the histories and traditions of all nations. Ever the questing search has gone on. Sometimes through prophecies, or even as through prophecies, until Jesus shows the simplicity and plainness of the way by the individual to a loving heavenly father, near, sympathetic, accessible.

The services at Zion Presbyterian Church yesterday were presided by large and appreciative congregations. The morning worship was conducted by the Minister, Rev. C. Webster who delivered a kindly message on the theme "God's plan of a Christian," taking as his text, Ephesians 1:10. He said that the world is filled with all the fullness of God. Paul was an extremist in the highest sense of the word, said the minister. Many sacred memories of former days were recalled by a congregation which filled the large edifice to capacity.

FIRST PARISH PRIEST

The first priest to take charge of the parish of Rustico was Reverend James MacEachern who had accompanied the Scotchborn pioneers in 1772. He died in 1785. In 1790 Reverend Angus B. MacEachern, who later became the Bishop of Charlottetown, arrived in the Island. He spent much of his time at Rustico. From 1790 to 1803, Reverend Amable Richard, a native of Quebec, France, was pastor. He was succeeded by Father de Calonne who remained only one year, so that the parish once more was looked after by Rev. Father MacEachern.

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HEROIC RESCUE

The story of an heroic rescue from drowning at the village of Vernon was told over the week end. Frederick Furness, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Furness of Vernon, last Saturday afternoon, was out on a fishing party with his father and brother. The boat was not a strong swimmer and had gone beyond his depth and nearly drowned. Furness was about 100 yards away at the time, and at first did not realize his companion was in trouble, but when he did, he made his way against the strong tide running at the time, and had to dive several times before he was able to bring Daron to the surface. He towed him to shore, and after applying artificial respiration for 15 minutes, carried him to the Furness home nearby, where it was three hours before Furness, with the aid of his father, completely revived the victim.

BUSINESS CONDITIONS PROMISING

While car loadings were five per cent below last year's figures, and passenger business conditions in Upper Canada were promising, Major F. C. L.
