### New Quarters For Falconwood Patients Now About Completed

(Continued from Page 1) with the main office, four wards and a number of private rooms. From the ground floor one descends a fireproof stairway to the basement, the walls of which are fire-proofed all around. One large room in this section, with closets, bathroom and toilet, is for the staff. The kitchen and dining room are connected by apertures for the passage of dishes and are fitted up with every convenience. Off the kitchen is a large storeroom for supplies and numerous built-in closets and pantries have been provided. The fire room has been reinforced and a new main has been cut into the boiler.

The second and third floor, which are remodelled on the same plan as the ground floor, have four wards each, with private rooms each end. There are six private rooms on each floor, the upper floor containing also a number of strong rooms for the confinement of troublesome patients. The interior with the exception of the strong rooms, which are of solid boards, is finished in insul Donnicon board, and presents a bright and clean appearance.

The floors have been covered with several layers of heavy roofing paper, and have thus been made absolutely waterproof.

Credit for the installation of the extensive electrical work is due to Mr. James Brown, for the plumbing to Mr. Fred Trainor, for the steam fitting work, to Mr. James Currie, and for the brick work, to Mr. James Gormley. The carpenter work was done under the foremanship of Messrs. Wilfred Burke, Thomas Harper and Charles Coles the whole being superintended by Mr. A. H. MacDougall, of the firm of MacDougall and McAnlay. The thoroughness with which all details have been carried out reflects credit upon these gentlemen, as well as upon the architects, Mr. J. E. Harris and Mr. E. S. Blanchard.

During the remodelling operations as many as seventy men have been employed at one time. Yesterday twenty-eight workmen including sixteen carpenters, were busy completing the job.

A Guardian representative, shown through the building yesterday, was favorably impressed with improvements made by the addition of many new windows, which give every room an air of cheerfulness and brightness. The care taken to safeguard the patients from accident on stairways and otherwise was also noticeable. Every available space in the building has been utilized for some purpose of service or convenience, and the result should prove very satisfactory for the accommodation of the patients for as long a time as is necessary pending the construction of a permanent institution.
