A TRUST COMPANY FOR P. E. ISLAND

At the last session of the Legislature of this island, upon a largely and influentially signed petition, an Act was passed incorporating "The P. E. I. Trust Company."

These present were the Hon. J. A. Mathieson, (the Premier), Hon. Murdoch McKinnon, (Commissioner of Agriculture), His Honor K. J. Martin, S. M., Mr. A. A. McDonald, M. P., Messrs. D. A. Wedlock, Walter Mathieson, C. Lyons, C. L. Grant, H. Roy Holman, R. N. McNeill, D. B. Stewart, B. Rogers, Thomas Wilkinson, of Alberton, and B. Tanton, of Summerside.

Mr. Mathieson then explained the purpose of the meeting and the objects and uses of the organization the establishment of which was under consideration at that meeting.
