**WHOLESALE PRICES:**

The course of wholesale commodity prices, which has been declining for some time, continued downward during the month of June. The Dominion Bureau of Statistics index number for that month, based on 1926 as 100, was 122.2 as compared with 123.0 in May and 122.7 in June, 1930. Since the beginning of the year there has been a decline of 5.3 points. In the corresponding period of last year there was a decline of 8.3 points, indicating that while the drop in wholesale prices has continued, it has been less precipitate than a year ago. The wholesale price index has been declining steadily since 1925 when it was 102.7, based on the monthly average, as against 100.0 in 1929, 97.7 in 1927, 96.1 in 1928, 89.9 in 1929, and 86.0 in 1930.

**FROM FINANCIAL COUNSEL:**

In connection with the final agreement between France and the United States on the Hoover debt suspension proposal the question which has suggested itself to many investors and traders is whether the stock market is justified or is likely to advance merely on such a proposal, when business conditions have as yet shown very little sign of improvement. In this issue of the Analyst, New York, which is after stating that the industrial picture in the United States continues gloomy, remarks: "Repeated experience has shown it is folly to attempt to interpret stock market movements entirely on the basis of business fluctuation. There are other and important factors which at times completely overshadow business developments as market influences. The most important of these are large financial interests, the temper of the public and the technical position of the market itself. It is entirely possible for the stock market to move for weeks and even for months against the trend of business."

**Rome Letter**

ROME, Italy, July 9. (U.P.)—The Italian Touring Club has recently published a Gastronomic Guide to Italy which treats of the different famous dishes to be enjoyed in various regions. The guide is not a mere book of culinary recipes, but a guide to good eating, writing with style and enthusiasm. Each of the regions is dealt with, and then out of the way towns and villages noted for some table specialty are mentioned. No part of the meal is omitted in the guide, from the bread to the meat, from soup to vegetables, from fish to fruit.

Bologna, for instance, is famous for its "tagliatelle," a form of spaghetti cut in ribbon shape. Genoa has its "trenette con pesto," another form of spaghetti. Milan delights in rice, in the form of "risotto," while Rome, besides consuming a huge quantity of kids, and young lambs, is very fond of artichokes fried in oil. The gastronomic guide deals also with the various wines of Italy, which are legion, ranging from the light white wines of the northern provinces to the heavy strong wines of Sicily, which sometimes contain as much as 18 per cent alcohol. The guide speaks, too, of well known folk lore festivals, at which original and characteristic dishes are eaten, such as the festival of St. John the Baptist, in Rome, when snails and frogs are special dishes.

The government is doing much to favor the coming of foreign students to Italy to take a cultural studies. There is a regular university for foreigners at Perugia with a distinguished faculty and a steady attendance of students from many parts of the world. Although this university which has its location in one of the beautiful old palaces of mediaeval Perugia, has been in existence only since 1926, it has acquired a reputation throughout Europe. It is open to all foreigners and its object is to spread a better and greater knowledge of Italy and the Italian language.
