BRITONS FEAR ANTI-CHURCH ACT

LONDON, Mar. 4.—All England is talking today of the possible disestablishment and disendowment of the Church of England and Wales, because of the resolution in favor of such action which passed the House of Commons, 188 votes to 80. The church party is wildly agitated.

While this resolution does not commit the government, the debate upon it was interesting on account of a statement made by Augustine Birrell, the Chief Secretary for Ireland. Mr. Birrell said he failed to see how the continuance of the established church could be justified. The church had done the state no good, and the state had done the church nothing but harm.

Personally, Mr. Birrell said, he believed that disestablishment, far from harming the church as a spiritual body would restore it to a position of spiritual authority throughout the land. The government's hands, however, are already too full to assume any responsibility in the matter, he declared.

The only previous time a similar resolution was pressed to a division was in May, 1871, and it was then rejected by a large majority.

Augustine Birrell is one of the most interesting personalities in the administration. Mrs. Birrell is a cousin of Lord Elgin and the favorite niece of Queen Victoria's best loved friend, the late Lady Augusta Stanley. Mrs. Birrell was the wife of Lionel Tennyson, the great poet's second son. Left a widow in 1888, she later became the wife of Mr. Birrell, then arising barrister and budding politician.

AUDACIOUS PLAN OF ADVENTURERS

CAPETOWN, Mar. 4.—The local police have just learned of the details of a daringly conceived and audacious plan to capture the island of Calabes, a Dutch possession in the Malay Archipelago, situated on the east of Borneo. A band of 3,000 armed adventurers planned to concentrate and descend on the island and hold it by force against the Dutch while its mineral riches were being developed and worked. It was intended, however, to demand mining concessions from the Dutch government and only to employ force in the event of a refusal. The police got a clue to the venture and following this trail were led to raid last night certain premises in Cape Town where they seized a number of documents relating to the organization of the enterprise, which it is alleged, has branches in England, on the continent, in the United States and in other countries.
