This is a condition which will probably not be improved until that portion of the street referred to is paved like the centre of the street. The need of having this done to protect the cement is imperative.

Work on Highways In This Province

In the House of Commons the 20th inst. Mr. Nicholson obtained from the Hon. Mr. Reid a succinct statement of the work done and to be done in this Province under "the Canada Highways Act". Mr Nicholson asked:

1 Has the province of Prince Edward Island taken any action regarding federal grants under the Canada Highways Act, 1919?

2 If so, for how many highways in Prince Edward Island have project statements been approved by the Minister of Railways?

3 What are the highways in respect to which agreement for federal aid have been reached between the province of Prince Edward Island and the Minister of Railways?

4 Have any sums been paid to the province of Prince Edward Island under the Canada Highways Act? If so, what is the total amount up to March 31, 1921?

5 To what road or roads do these payments apply?

6 For what highways in Prince Edward Island have project statements been filed by the Provincial Government, and not yet approved by the Minister of Railways?

Hon Mr REID:

1 Yes.

2 Eleven.

3 Agreements have been fully executed covering the following eight highways: Georgetown Road, from Ten Mile House, in the County of Queens, to the boundary line between Counties of Queens and Kings, 8 miles. Tryon Road, from New Haven to Queens Arms, 8 miles. Irishtown Road, from Kensington to Bryenton's Corners, 3 1-2 miles. Western Road, from O'Leary Road to Mt Pleasant, 12 miles. Somers Road, from McMahon's to Elmira Road, 8 1-2 miles. Dundas Road, from Dundas to Rollo Bay, 8 1-2 miles. Johnson's River Road, from Boyver's Brook to Webster's Corners, 9 miles. Montague Road, from Montague to Gardigan Road, 5 1-2 miles.

Agreements covering the following 3 highways projects have been prepared by the Department and forwarded to the province for execution: Commercial Road, from Murray River to Montague, 10 miles. Cardigan-St. Peter's Road, from Cardigan to St. Peter's 13

to its decision to cut cost of living bonus for 1921—22, 25 per cent.
