**INTERESTING LETTER FROM REV. G. C. TAYLOR**

The following letter to Mr. F. J. Nash, Charlottetown, from Rev. G. C. Taylor, Chaplain of the 106th P. E. Island Battalion now in England, will be read with interest by the many Island friends of this regiment:—

Witley Camp, 23-11-16.

Mr. Fred J. Nash,  
Charlottetown:

Dear Mr. Nash:—

Just as I am sitting down to write you the order has again come for a draft from the 106th, naturally almost everybody in the camp is in a state of excitement but for my own part I have seen nothing else for it from the start. The draft from our regiment will go to reinforce some other battalion already in the trenches but I do not think they will see any fighting until the spring. There will be some desperate work then. It is estimated that within a month the whole camp at Witley will have gone The Canadians at the front are short over 20,000 men and I see no other way out of it but to rush over every available man. I know that to one in Charlottetown it seems quite easy to send the regiment over intact but where we have the grim facts before us we judge quite otherwise. Not long ago a certain regiment went into action over a thousand strong and came out with 63 men and not an officer. That is not an isolated case and our regiment could be no exception to the rule. As for going to the front as a unit I have never seen the slightest chance for it. Of course the boys don't want to be separated but yet ask them if they want to go as a unit into the trenches they promptly say, no. It is the same with every regiment one meets here for when men get down to real hard facts concerning fighting in these days sentiment will give way to common sense. For my own part I can imagine nothing more tragic than to send the 106th into action as a regiment. I am positive that many of our men will distinguish themselves on the field but that is only possible under certain conditions. Apart from that they would only be like sheep going to the slaughter. I am sure from all I have seen and heard that it would not be permitted under any pressure. For my own part I don't know what is going to befall me. By military custom I am senior chaplain in this camp and have the right to go on the first lot of padre's but I cannot tell just what may happen. One thing I am sure of, if the 106th is broken up and I am not allowed to go to France in my turn I shall certainly revert to the artillery and go in any case and in any capacity. Well, the day has come at last for what has often looked to many of the boys as a thing of the distant future—we are getting ready for France and I regret that even although we have been five months in England, within reach of some of its most interesting towns and cities over half our men have never been away on leave. Some of them, after having put in requests for leave time and again, were to have left for London today but again, as many times in the past, all leave is cancelled and they are on draft to go to France having never had a holiday since coming to England.

Well, here we are in Witley and, to us, after Digbate this is just heaven. No use to tell you what we went through of mud and wet and discomfort before we finally stampeded for our new camp. It is all part of the game and my sense of humor helped me to grin through it all.

Since coming here where we are in huts we are in comparative luxury and if you were to call in and see me here you would say that war was not such a matter of hardship after all. One can do a great deal toward his own comfort even in spite of red tape, so here I have all the modern conveniences from a bath to a bookshelf. Our camp is just 35 miles from London and Surrey is the loveliest county in England. I have not been slow to see all I can of it and so have gone about considerably since coming here. Godalming with its famous charterhouse school is only four miles away. Here also is a memorial to Phillips the heroic operator of the Titanic. Farnham is about six miles distant and here is Waverley Abbey and a fine old castle. At Haslemere is Tennyson's home and at Compton a gallery of paintings by
