ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

THE JURY CASES will commence at the Supreme Court this morning.

T. B. RILEY has decided not to enter the contest for City Councillor.

OWING to the snow storm yesterday the special train did not leave for Georgetown till five o'clock this morning.

A SPECIAL meeting of the City Council is to be held this afternoon to consider the electric wires by law and to amend the snow by law.

CAPT. R. McMillan returned on Saturday from Halifax where he has been in connection with the fitting up of the Elliott for the seal fisheries. The Elliott is at present laying up at Halifax and it is expected she will sail early in March with over a hundred men for the sealing grounds off the coast of Newfoundland.

THE STANLEY arrived at Pictou Saturday at eleven o'clock. Her cargo included 4 horses, 8 cars oats, 250 boxes smelts, 100 dressed hogs, 70 quarters beef and forty packages sundries. The Minto reached Georgetown shortly after ten. She had a general cargo including 400 packages sundries. There were also twenty-five passengers and 100 bags mails.

A bad runaway took place Saturday afternoon on Euston Street. A horse driven by Von. Ciere Gay with Mrs. Gay and family in the sleigh in turning the corner of Prince and Euston upset the occupants and was away in a flash. The animal dashed down Euston and before captured at Queen Street badly demoralized the harness and the sleigh. None of the occupants were seriously injured.

"MANY people of Truro and vicinity will be very much pleased to learn that Rev. M. A. McLean decided not to accept the call extended to him by the Olive Church of New Westminster, B. C. If he had decided to go, his place would have been hard to fill as pastor of Immanuel church, as he has endeared himself to his flock during his pastorate of nearly four years among them. An excellent Cantata, "Santa Claus Dream," was well carried through by the children and the choir. Then followed a short and well rendered program Santa Claus, now thoroughly awakened from his dream and delighted with the small folk of the present generation, did his best to make them happy with gifts of candy &c., gathered from the Christmas tree. After singing "God save the King," the audience passed out to witness the baloon ascension which was to conclude the program. In the beautiful moonlight the baloon ascended—in smoke. HIS Lordship Bishop McDonald returned Saturday from Halifax where he has been in conference with the Archbishop of Halifax. Of it the Halifax Chronicle says:—A conference of the Roman Catholic Bishops of the Maritime Provinces was held in this City yesterday. Those present were Bishop Barry, of Chatham, N. B., who arrived on Wednesday evening, Bishop Cameron, of Antigonish, and Bishop McDonald, of Prince Edward Island, who arrived in the City yesterday morning. The conference which opened yesterday afternoon was held at the residence of His Grace Archbishop O'Brien. Only general matters pertaining to the Dioceses were considered. These conferences are being held annually. The first one in this City was held last year. The Archbishop and Bishops met again last evening, and it is expected that the visiting Prelates will leave for their homes today.

THE semi-annual examination of Upton School, Dundas, took place at the school house on the 13th, inst. The trustees and a goodly number of visitors and reporters were present. The examination was conducted by the trustees and others. The pupils exhibited a thorough knowledge of what they have studied and answered the questions put to them without any hesitation.
