OAKLAND TO P. E. I. BY CAR.—Verly distance is being annihilated. This is the transportation improvement era. The advancement in locomotion facilities is more apparent than advancement in the other sciences. Five thousand, one hundred and eleven miles, (5111), was registered on Mr. W. K. Owen's car on the trip from Oakland Calif., to P. E. Island. Mr. Owen, who is accompanied by his wife and daughter, is a "native son" of P. E. I.—a brother of Mr. Lee Owen of Hamilton. He has been absent from this province for nearly twenty years, and like many "islanders abroad," has prospered in the land of his adoption.

The nine thirty Mass at the Cathedral yesterday was most largely attended on the occasion of the solemn ceremony of the ordination of Rev. Joseph Basil Croken to the high dignity of the Holy Priesthood. The ceremony was performed by His Lordship Bishop Louis O'Leary, assisted by Rev. Fr. Patk. McMahon as Archdeacon; Rev. Fr. Louis Callaghan, Notary; and Rev. Fr. Patk. Walsh as Master of Ceremonies. Rev. Fr. D. Croken assisted the young priest.

Father Croken, who is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Croken, formerly of Indian River, now of this city, previous to his taking of Theology in the seminary, attended St. Dunstan's University. When the ceremony was completed yesterday, a large number of friends advanced to the altar rail to receive the young priest's blessing.

At his home in Montague on Saturday, June 18th, after a few months illness there passed away to his eternal home, Mr. A. J. Robertson, aged 78 years.

The late Mr. Robertson was born at Brudenell and lived on the old homestead till six years ago when he took up his abode at Montague. In early life he married Miss Margaret Hooper of Beauce, who predeceased him five years ago. Eight months ago he married Mrs. Emma Coffin, widow of the late Charles Coffin, who lives to cherish his memory. He also leaves to mourn a nephew, Mr. Charles Robertson, Brudenell, and other relatives in Boston.

For 52 years he was a faithful member of the Montague Baptist Church serving the Church as Deacon for twenty-four years and as Treasurer for over forty years. His decease is keenly felt by the Church to whom he devoted his life with the utmost consecration.

The funeral services were held in the Baptist Church Monday at two o'clock and were conducted by the pastor L. C. Russel Wallace assisted by Dr. Genge of the Presbyterian Church and Rev. John Sterling of the United Church. A very large number of friends gathered

to pay tribute to one who was highly respected. His favorite hymn "The Haven of Rest" was sung by the choir and a solo "Rock of Ages" was effectively rendered by Mrs. T. G. Ives. On May 8, 1927, there passed peacefully away at his home in Pictou, Nova Scotia, Michael H. Mahar, a highly esteemed citizen and meat merchant of that place. He was loved and respected by all that knew him and his many acts of kindness and charity won for him the esteem of the whole community. Although he had been in the business for the past few months death came as a distinct shock to his many friends. He was attended by the best medical skill and kind nursing, but proved to no avail. Deceased was the son of the late Edward Mahar, of Sturgeon, Prince Edward Island, and went to Nova Scotia about twenty years ago and started a business. Fortune favored him and a few years ago he sold his meat market and retired. He was accustomed to a life of activity, however, and a short time later was back into the meat business which he continued until the time of his death. About two years ago he sold his beautiful home at the end of Patterson Street and bought the St. Julian Hotel. Deceased was 63 years of age and his passing is indeed sad. He leaves to mourn a grief-stricken wife, formerly Marie Innis of Pictou County, one daughter, Miss Olive K. Mahar, R. N. Providence, R. I., and four brothers and two sisters, namely William G. and Edward A. Sturgeon; J. J. of Brownville, Maine; S. M. of Hartford, Conn.; sisters are Ellen A. and Margaret of Sturgeon.

His remains were taken from his home on Tuesday morning to St. Stella Maria Church, where a requiem high mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul, thence to the Railway Station followed by a large concourse of people and thence to Prince Edward Island for burial. The remains were accompanied by his wife and daughter, arrived at Montague on Wednesday morning and was conveyed to the home of his brother, Edward A. Mahar. The funeral was held on Thursday morning at 9 o'clock and was largely attended. Requiem high mass was celebrated in St. Paul's Church by the pastor, Rev. Theo. Gallant who also officiated at the grave where all that was mortal of a kind and loving husband father and brother was laid to rest. May his soul rest in peace.

INSPECTION TOUR.—Mr. Peter Brodie, president of the Swine Breeders' Association of Prince Edward Island, is the first farmer in Canada to book reservation with the Farmers' Marketing Tour to the Old Land now being organized by the Canadian National Railways. Mr. Brodie, writing to make his reservations, expresses his keen desire to take advantage of the tour to inspect the packing establishments in Britain and Denmark. Arrangements have now been completed for the tour to sail from Halifax on January 8th, next, with thirty-one days spent in Britain and Denmark. It is expected that nearly 200 Canadian farmers will take advantage of the tour.

NEW POTATO WAREHOUSES.—A number of large potato warehouses will be erected along the R. R. line this summer in preparation for housing and storing the crop of this season. Capt. J. W. Effe has already on the grounds a large quantity of lumber and tiles preparatory to beginning work shortly on a building 100x24 feet on the R. R. land at Emerald Junction. The Captain has about one hundred and ninety acres planted with Cobblers and Green Mountain Potatoes and if the crop is as bountiful as the past seasons he will be doing something this fall. Mr. McEntee and Mr. Ryan are also building smaller warehouses at Emerald.
