THE CENTENARY AT COVEHEAD

Appropriate and Successful Celebration of the Anniversary of the Coming of First Presbyterian Minister to That Congregation—Large Attendance and Attractive Program.

The manner in which the centenary of the arrival of the first Presbyterian minister in Prince Edward Island was celebrated at Covehead yesterday was most creditable to all who were in any way connected with the function.

Yesterday those who comprise the people of these congregations, many of them descendants of Mr. Gordon's parishioners united to honor the memory of him who was the first to teach their faith on Prince Edward Island.

The attendance was large, those who attended being drawn to the scene through an earnest desire to show their interest in the occasion, and the splendidly arranged and appropriate program was thoroughly appreciated by all.

A number of eloquent addresses were made and valuable historical data was furnished by the speakers of the day who acquitted themselves with distinction and were listened to with the keenest interest.

His Honor Lieut. Governor MacKinnon presided and delivered the opening address in the morning. He contrasted the present condition of Prince Edward Island with what it was a hundred years ago.

Dr. Baxter's speech was entitled Then and Now, and in its scope compared the advancement that has been made in invention and science in the past 100 years, referring particularly to the great improvements in electricity and the changes wrought in the customs of the people.

ST. JOHN, N.B., August 22—(Special)—Miss Mary McAulay neice and house-keeper of Rev. Father E. J. McAulay, priest at Newland, Albert County, was foully murdered at her home on Sunday evening.

The crime was not discovered until Tuesday, when Father McAulay, who had been visiting in this City returned home, and found the lifeless body in the woods with her throat cut from ear to ear.

CUBAN RESIGNS STATE POSITION

HAVANA, Aug. 21—Justice O'Farrell, Secretary of State, who was acting as Secretary of the Interior, has resigned from the cabinet. His action was due to a dispute with the President over the Insurrectionary movement, and for not strongly grasping the situation. This culminated in the appointment yesterday of General Rayfuef Montala, Secretary of Public Works, to take direct charge of all military operations against the insurgents.

BAND PLAYED SAILORS DANCED

Incidents in the Grounding of the Battleship Dominion off Souris, P. E. I.

MONTREAL, August 21—Details of the accident to H. M. Dominion while on her way from Halifax have been divulged. It was about 8:30 Thursday last that the Dominion, stranded off Souris, Prince Edward Island. The navigating officer mistook the light which proved to have been caused by a bush fire for one of the Souris range lights. The ship struck two obstacles, over which she passed and grounded on the third. The shocks were so heavy that Mrs. Kingsmill, the captain's wife, who had boarded the ship at Halifax, was prostrated and had to be attended by the ship's doctor.

THE EARTHQUAKE AT VALPARAISO

Optimistic Report of Chilean Consul General At New York—Says that Stricken City Will be Rebuilt in Six Months—Trade to be Quickly Resumed.

NEW YORK, August 22—(Special)—Adolfo Ortuzar, councillor-general for Chile said yesterday that he believed Valparaiso would be re-built within six months and that trade would completely be reestablished before that time.

The Chilean representative's optimistic prediction as to the trade was favorably seconded by several merchants who did business with the stricken city of Valparaiso.

FIRE LOSSES IN NEW BRUNSWICK

ST. JOHN, August 21—Despatches tonight tell of welcome thunder showers at Fredericton, St. Stephen and elsewhere, which will do much to stay the ravaging forest fires. Great damage, however, has already been done. A fire 5 miles wide was reported in the McConnell Brook, a branch of the Dugargan river, on the Miramichi Lumber company's lands, and 200 men have been fighting it.

THE GREEKS HAD THE BULGARIANS

PHILIPPOPOLIS, Bulgaria. A monster meeting of 20,000 inhabitants of this city and surrounding districts, which also was attended by 1,900 delegates from Macedonian associations in all parts of Bulgaria, yesterday adopted resolutions protesting against Greek outrages and urging the Government and the nation to use all means to secure a strict enforcement of article 23 of the Treaty of Berlin to break off diplomatic negotiations with Greece, to meet the Greek outrage with all the reprisals permitted by international law and to affirm the inadequacy of the Muerzegg programme, which provide for the maintenance of status quo in the Balkans.

AN INSURRECTION NOW ON IN CUBA

HAVANA, Aug. 21—An insurrection began last night in Havana province, when General Quintin Bandera, the general who distinguished himself in the war for independence, left Arroyo Arenas, 12 miles west of Havana, with a force, which was largely augmented today by a band armed with guns and ammunition, which set out for Havana.
