Livestock Report

MONTREAL, Que., March 5.—Livestock—Cattle receipts 731. There were no top cattle offered and about half of the total offering was made up of very common stock that has been culled from dairy herds. A few of the best quality which were of fairly good quality were sold for \$10.50. Medium quality steers brought from \$9.25 to \$10.00 and some very thin yearlings as low as \$6.50. Good heifers sold up to \$9.50 and prices were from that figure down to \$5.00 for young heifers of little better than canner quality. A few choice cows were weighed out at \$9.00. Good cows sold from \$7.50 to \$8.25, and medium kinds around \$6.00 to \$6.50. Bulls were from \$5.50 to \$8.50.

Quotations—Butcher steers, good \$10.00 to \$10.50; medium \$9.25 to \$10.00; common \$6.50 to \$9.00; butcher heifers, good \$9.00 to \$9.50; medium \$7.50 to \$8.50; commons \$5.00 to \$7.25; butcher cows, good \$3.75 to \$4.50; medium \$5.00 to \$7.00; canners \$3.50 to \$3.75; cutters \$7.50 to \$8.50; medium \$5.50 to \$6.75. Calf receipts 828, the bulk of calves offered were grassers, and these were very hard to sell. \$5.50 was the best price paid for some of the lighter ones. The heavy kinds and yearlings were not wanted. Veals were lower. Small butchers purchased sparingly, anticipating lower prices later in the week. A few lots of fairly good veals were sold between \$11.00 and \$12.00 and two or three small lots choice veals at \$12.50 and \$13.00, common calves \$10.00 to \$11.00.

Quotations—Good veal \$12.50 to \$13.00, medium \$11.00, common \$10.00 to \$11.00. Grassers \$5.00 to \$5.50. Sheep receipts 44. Common lambs \$11.00; sheep \$5.00 to \$7.00, according to quality.
Quotations—Ewes, \$5.00 to \$7.00; common lambs \$11.00; hogs receipts 1,775. With a very light run on hogs, some of which were sold a-head, the local butchers took nearly everything offered today. The ruling price was \$9.75 on a flat basis, a few lots of poorest quality hogs were weighed up at \$9.60 and two cars of good quality Ontario hogs brought \$9.90 flat. Packers bid \$9.50 with \$1.00 per hog bonus on selects and \$1.00 per hog cut on shops. Sows sold for \$8.00 and \$8.25.
