THE BRITISH EDUCATION BILL.

This bill which has passed the House of Commons by a large majority, has for its general principle that any school supported out of state funds must be subjected to public control. If any religious denomination prefers to have its own schools it may have them, but it must maintain them without state aid, either national or local. If it passes the Lords the new act will take the place of the Balfour act which was so offensive to Nonconformists.

There is some speculation as to what the Lords may do with the bill, the prevalent opinion being that they will hesitate to reject it, owing to the strong popular mandate behind the Government of the day. The measure as it stands is qualified by a number of minor compromises which are not agreeable to the wishes of the Government's more radical supporters, while its general principle, as above set forth has its hearty endorsement.

Calgary, of which we have long heard so much, and which many believed to be quite a large city, is shown by the recent census to have 11,733 people—a little less than Charlottetown. The same is true of Edmonton with a population of 11,334.

BOER AND BRITON TREATED ALIKE

LONDON, Aug. 1.—In a speech of great moderation, carefully designed to propitiate his opponents, Winston Spencer Churchill, parliamentary secretary of the colonial office, in the house of commons this afternoon explained the government's plans to confer a constitution on the Transvaal. Dwelling on the urgency of the question, he described the Transvaal as the nerve centre of South Africa, and said the new country reproduced in miniature all the dark and tangled problems of the old established European states.

The government's guiding principle had been to treat Boer and Briton alike and to make no distinction in granting the boon of British citizenship both to the men who fought loyally for Great Britain and to those who resisted the British arms with desperate courage. While the government has been careful to secure for the British every advantage they might justly claim, South Africa's future depended on both races learning to look to the mother country as a friend. The government decided for the principle of manhood suffrage against any property qualification. There for every adult male twenty-one years old, who had been a resident six months in South Africa except members of the British garrison, would be entitled to vote under the secret ballot system.

THE ELECTRIC LOCOMOTIVE.

The New York Central Railway has installed the most powerful electric locomotive in the world on its lines. It is to be followed by thirty to fifty more of the same sort, designed to handle the traffic of the Central on its two principal lines from 24 to 31 miles out of New York City. One of these locomotives can handle a passenger train of ten or more carriages making a running speed of 60 to 70 miles an hour. It is quite possible that the system thus begun for suburban traffic may be extended to the entire line. This is yet doubtful, of course, as some believe the steam locomotive will continue to hold the ground for heavy trains and long hauls. For seventy years steam has had almost a monopoly as a motive power for railways outside of cities. From Stephenson's Rocket weighing 9½ tons and drawing two coaches at a rate of ten miles an hour the steam locomotive has developed to a weight of 150 tons, capable of moving a train weight of 800 tons at almost any speed that may be desired.

But steam has its drawbacks, its dirt and smoke, the constant shoveling of coal, and the need of two men in each engine. The electric engine requires but one man in charge, and two or more of them can be coupled, when required for heavy draft or higher speed, the two being operated by one man. There is no coal to handle, no stops for fuel or water, no smoke, less noise and no pounding of the track as in the case where steam power is used. The question of cost is, of course, vital but experiments so far have demonstrated that for handling suburban passenger traffic electricity will be found more economical than steam. This is found true where electricity is produced by coal. The comparison is more favorable to electricity where water power is available. Again, it has been found that the use of electric power contributes to the safety and comfort of passengers, and that where an electric line has paralleled a steam line the former has been preferred by the travelling public.
