LIVERPOOL, Eng. — The Catholic Women's League, which already has opened three huts and canteens in the Liverpool archdiocese for Servicemen, hopes to open in the city a club for women in the Forces. This was announced by Mrs. Bligh, J. P., when she presided at the annual meeting of the Liverpool section of the League. Mrs. Bligh said the Government wanted voluntary organizations to look after the women in the Forces, but was not giving any financial assistance. The C.W.L. was the only body in Liverpool which provided in its huts and canteens special rooms for women. Mrs. Spall, hon. secretary, said large parcels of clothing had been received from the Catholic women of Canada for the use of evacuees and the bombed-out, and these had helped the League very greatly in its work for numerous families in need.
