MONDAY

LAI D TO REST.—The funeral of the late Mrs. Adam Murray took place Saturday afternoon from the home to the People's Cemetery, the pall bearers being Messrs. A. E. Morrison, Geo. E. Hughes, John McInnis, S. A. McLeod, G. H. Taylor and W. B. Robertson. Rev. W. Orr Mulligan officiated at the services. The funeral was largely attended.

P. E. I. LADY ADMITTED TO BAR.—An Island lady, Miss Helen D. Steeves, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cory W. Steeves, of Summerside, was recently admitted to the bar of Alberta, and will practice law in that province. Mr. Justice Tweedie, who admitted Miss Steeves, paid a tribute to her scholarship at Dalhousie University, where she received her degree and congratulated her upon the work both as a student at examinations and in practice. She is the fourth lady to become eligible to follow the law profession in Alberta.

The reports of the Canon Simpson Memorial Fund Committee were received, much satisfaction being expressed with the permanent front erected. The Warden's report and business statement showed a small surplus for the ordinary current receipts of the church during the year, the total receipts from all sources being \$6,620.

The Annual Meeting of St. James Congregation held last night in the Church hall was very largely attended. The pastor, Rev. W. Orr Mulligan, occupied the chair during the devotional exercises, after which Mr. K. J. Martin, Chairman of Trustees, took the chair, and Mr. W. A. Stewart was appointed secretary of the meeting.

Reports of the different organizations connected with the church were then read. The Guild, of which Miss Edna A. Ross is secretary, and Miss Margaret F. Irving treasurer, reported total receipts for the year \$660.42.

The Ladies Aid Society, of which Mrs. A. E. Morrison is President, and Miss Katharine C. Irving is secretary, reported the work of the year as very satisfactory.

The Canadian Girls in Training, of which Miss Amy Agnew is President, and Miss Constance Hunter, secretary, reported receipts of \$56.15.

The W. M. S., Miss C. Maude Jamieson, secretary, reported total receipts for the year, \$451.20.

The Mission Band, Benj. Rogers, secretary, reported collections \$26.80.

Mr. W. A. Stewart on behalf of the Dr. Fretton Monument Committee, reported that a granite monument had been erected at a cost of \$912.00.

The following trustees were elected in place of the four retiring members of the Board and to fill the vacancy created by the departure from the city of Mr. J. H. Malcolm: Keith Rogers, Dr. Houson, K. M. Martin, Jr., A. L. Hyndman and Dr. V. F. Goodwill.

The report of the Session, which was the ninety-ninth annual report of that body, reported a net increase in membership of 17. The report also acknowledged the receipt of a beautiful and valuable Communion Set from the members of the family of the late Col. Daniel Stewart, in memory of their father, also receipt from the Ladies' Aid of a beautiful pulpit gown and cassock.

The financial statement showed total receipts by envelopes, open collections, etc., of \$5,392.74. After the business of the meeting was over, there was a short discussion on the question of Church Union participated in by Mr. Keith Rogers, Dr. V. L. Goodwill, Dr. Houson, Mr. R. H. Agnew and Judge Stewart, after which a standing vote was taken as to what action the congregation should take in the matter of Church Union. ENDED IN THE POLICE COURT.—There was considerable disturbance created Monday night at a church social in a rural community not far from the city during the auction of some pies. Police Officer Walker, who was attending the social, interfered when the rumpus raised by two or three threatened to break up the gathering. He received a nasty blow then came to Charlottetown and with Officer Trainor returned and arrested three of the peace disturbers, who appeared yesterday morning before the Stipendiary Magistrate on charges of drunkenness. Two were dismissed and one was fined \$10.

STARTING TO BUSH THE ICE.—Workmen are starting today to bush the ice on the river. Owing to the mildness of the season this work has been delayed much longer than usual. A number of the creeks on the coast have already been bushed. Mr. McMillan, secretary of the Provincial Public Works Department, says recalls only one year—in 1902—when it was necessary to delay the bushing so long. During that year the ferry boat ran from Charlottetown until Feb. 4th, and the first trip of the following season was made in March 17th.

SUPREME COURT.—At the Supreme Court yesterday before Mr. Justice Haszard and jury the case of Boswell Carver vs Julia Carver administratrix and others, came up for trial. The parties belong to Mount Albion and Cherry Valley. The action is on a promissory note for \$108.00 in favor of the late Francis Forbes in which the plaintiff claims who endorsed over to him for value, his contention being that he had built a house for the deceased. The defendant who was administratrix of the late Mr. Forbes denies that the note was so endorsed. The parties liable on the note have paid the money into the court to abide a result of the trial.
