CHRISTMAS IN THE FLEET WHICH SAVES ALL BRITONS BY WORK IN THE NORTH SEA

The heart of every British subject leaped to his mouth when he read yesterday's papers the story of the grand victory achieved by Sir David Beatty and his "boys" in the North Sea. We are therefore glad to publish through the courtesy of Mr. Frank East, of 669 Adam Street, Maison-neuve, the following extracts from a letter telling how the tars in the Grand Fleet (the greatest the world has ever seen) kept Christmas. It is a human document of the keenest interest.

"All Hands to Church" The preliminaries didn't take long this year, being no decorating to do, and about 10.30 all hands went to church. Everyone mustered round the quarter deck and was presented with Princess Mary's present—a wood pipe, packet of tobacco, a package of cigarettes, a Christmas card, and a little photo of herself.

Smoking was not allowed on mess decks—the only great Christmas privilege—on account of ammunition hanging round the gun positions, and in tender memory of the fate of the Bulwark.

PRUNING SHADE TREES. When once well along in growth shade trees require little pruning; still all ornamental trees require their shade to receive a pruning every two or three years to shape them. The pruning shade trees should receive ought to be in the form of keeping the dead parts removed and the limbs so thinned out as to prevent crowding. The trees, if not kept pruned, will become crowded heads, and nature, in an effort to prune the plants, kills off the interior limbs and soon the trees become cluttered with dead branches and rot, and other diseases infect the top.

SHADE TREES FOR SHEDS. Shade trees for sheds, they give ornament as for the shade, but their appearance as well as increase their left surface, that the dual purpose must be served. In pruning these trees, first cut away all dead and diseased parts, and open the tops sufficiently to admit light and air to the interior of the foliage.

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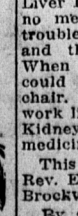

BEATTY YOUNGEST IN HIGH NAVAL COMMAND.

Sir David Beatty is one of the most remarkable men the British navy has ever known, the rapidity with which he achieved important rank having astonished all England. He is now in his forty-fourth year and has been a Rear-Admiral since 1910, when he was 29 years old, a year younger than Lord Nelson when he attained flag rank.

Sir David married Mrs Arthur Tree, a daughter of Marshall Field of Chicago. The marriage took place in 1901. Since then he has taken a prominent part in naval affairs. In 1896, when a Lieutenant, he commanded the naval forces in the Nile Campaign under Lord Kitchener. In 1900 he commanded the battleship Barfleur in the operations against the Boxer rebellion and was wounded twice. He was made a Captain for his conduct there at the age of 29.

In 1913 he was put in command of the first battle cruiser squadron, and in 1914, just before the outbreak of the war, he was knighted by King George.

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
