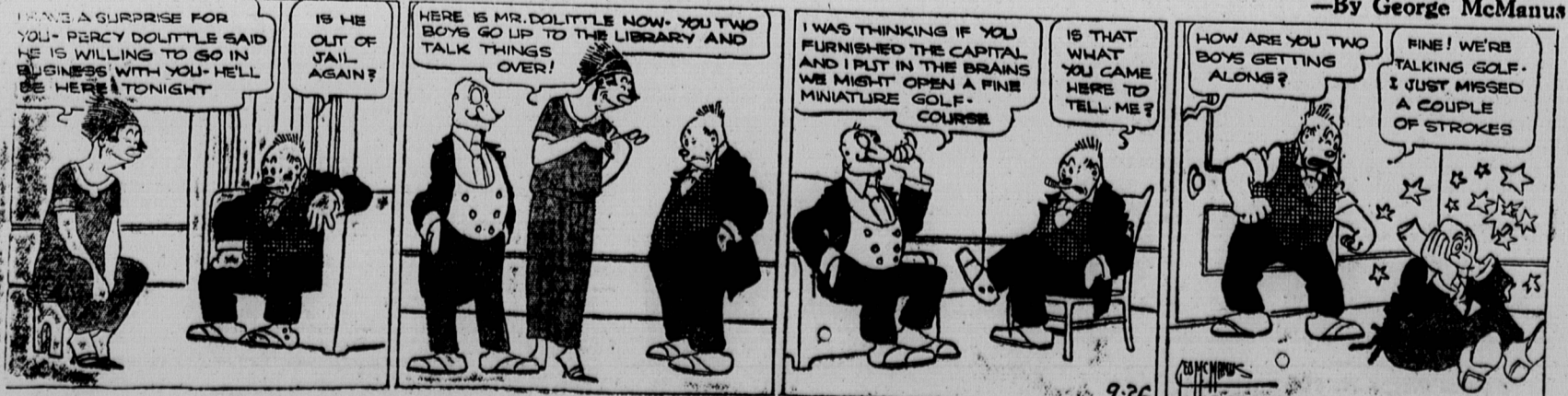
Miss Lettie Carrier, Cherry Valley, was the guest of Miss Mabel Docherty on Sunday last.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR HEARTZ ENDORSES The PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND HOSPITAL APPEAL

Having the honour of representing His Gracious Majesty in this Province now for over six years, and having been a Trustee of the Prince Edward Island Hospital for nearly fifteen years, and having occupied the position of Chairman of the Campaign Committee in connection with the raising of some \$80,000 in honour of forty years of service of this Institution in December, 1923, I feel that I am fully informed as to the great and noble work that is being and has been carried on by the Prince Edward Island Hospital, and also the grave necessity for a larger, better, more up-to-date and more cheerful Institution than the present gloomy and totally inadequate building known today as the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

In consequence, I have no hesitation in endorsing this very worthy and necessary movement of the Trustees and the friends of the Hospital to raise a sum sufficient for the purpose of erecting a more suitable building, and one more in keeping with present day requirements — a building which we all know will fill every requirement and be a credit to the Province.

ince. I feel confident that this appeal will meet with a generous support from all classes in the portions of this Province where it will be made.

I do not think that there is any necessity on my part to dwell upon the wonderful service that has been rendered by this Institution during the past forty-seven years. This will be attended to by those more qualified to speak than I am, but I would like to mention a few things of which I am cognizant.

Many thousands of persons from town and country have received relief and beneficial treatment within its doors. Many nurses, some who have achieved fame in other parts, have obtained a proper and fitting education within its walls.

Possibly six thousand persons have been treated free of all cost since its inception, and now that it has outgrown its usefulness, and the necessity has arisen for larger, better and brighter quarters, and for a larger staff, and a greater school of nurses, I earnestly hope that the effort now about to be made will be crowned with success by our generous people in town and country.
